Child Welfare Specialization

Purpose

The Child Welfare Specialization (CWS) has been designed to provide a program of studies that prepares students for practice in child welfare, while also satisfying the general practice criteria required for BSW accreditation and for designation as a Registered Social Worker (RSW).

Program Description

Students enrolled in the CWS are required to complete their fourth year practicum with the Ministry for Children and Family Development or a fully delegated First Nations child welfare agency. Completion of the specialization is noted on the student's graduating transcript.

Mode of Study

The school of social work offers a full-time and part-time program of studies using both classroom-based and web-based courses. Given the increasing use of online learning technology, it is important to become familiar with Blackboard as an online learning environment. The Northern Social Work Student Association with support from the Centre for Teaching, Learning and Technology host a Blackboard site where students can participate in a variety of online activities. SOCW 300-3 Communication Skills

Introductory course aimed at increasing communication skills in diverse cultural settings

SOCW 301-3 Critical Social Work Practice

Examines the origins, values, methods and applications of various social work practice approaches

SOCW 302-6 Social Work Field Education

This three-day per week field placement is a requirement for all students. It includes a bi-weekly integrative seminar

SOCW 310-3 First Nations Social Work Issues

Examines methods of developing an anti-racist social work practice in the context of First Nations experience

SOCW 320-3 Critical Social Policy

Examines the development of social policy in Canada

SOCW 330-3 Social Work Research/Policy/Practice

Introduces research methods and analysis techniques used to examine issues in the policy and practice of social work and social welfare

SOCW 336-3 Social Work Philosophy and Ethics

Critical assessment of the ethical issues involved in carrying out the tasks of social work, practice, policy and research

SOCW 401-3 Northern/Remote Social Work Practice

Aims to develop critical awareness/analysis of social problems in northern and remote communities

SOCW 402-15 Social Work Field Education

This field placement is five days per week throughout the entire term. For those choosing the Child Welfare Specialization, this placement must take place in a government child welfare service or a First Nation's child welfare agency

SOCW 420-3 Family/Child Welfare Policy

Focuses on feminist and FN critiques of child welfare policy and social work intervention

SOCW 421-3 Human Growth and Development

Examines human growth and development with an emphasis on social processes from birth to death

SOCW 422-3 Child Welfare Practice

Child maltreatment is examined from the perspective of social work practice in the field of child welfare. (Please note this is a full online course which will require specific computer software to access all of the course features).

SOCW 426-3 Current Issues in Child Welfare

Highlights topical child welfare issues and examines current trends in Child Welfare practice

SOCW 439-3 Social Work, Law and the Justice System

Examines various areas of the Canadian legal system including the practice of social work in court settings

Frequently Asked Questions:

Is there a separate application that needs to be submitted for the Child Welfare Specialization?

Upon admission, students must formally declare that they are completing the CWS.

Is tuition higher to complete the specialization?

There are no extra fees associated with this program. Completion of both the general BSW and the Child Welfare Specialization BSW are based on 60 credit hours of fees.

Will I be guaranteed a job?

Successful completion does not guarantee employment in the child welfare field.

Will I be limited to jobs in the child welfare field with this specialized Degree?

You will be granted a BSW Degree and you will be qualified to apply for positions that specify a BSW requirement.

If I complete this degree, does it affect my applying for a MSW Program?

No, as long as your grade point average (GPA) is satisfactory and you meet any post-degree experience requirements, you are eligible to apply to any MSW Program as the UNBC BSW Program is fully accredited with the Canadian Association for Social Work Education (CASWE).

Application Procedures:

The admissions criteria and application process for the Child Welfare Specialization are the same as applying to the BSW Program.
