FEATURED PROGRAM: UNIVERSITY OF THE ARCTIC

The University of the Arctic is a consortium of over 170 member institutions that was originally established as a way to provide online access to post-secondary courses for students living in Arctic regions around the globe. UArctic has since expanded its original mandate to include collaborative research across the UArctic members who work together to promote opportunities and to develop

programs beneficial to students and institutions.

At UNBC, UArctic activities are headed by Dr. Gary Wilson, who is UNBC's Representative on Council of UArctic. The Northern Studies program at UNBC, (http://www.unbc.ca/northernstudies) coordinated by Dr. Wilson, is an interdisciplinary BA Program that facilitates UArctic coursework and allows the student to fully ex-

plore issues and developments across the circumpolar north.

The Student Mobility program at UArctic (north2north) is coordinated by the International Education office through Student Exchange. The Study Abroad Fair held every October highlights the exchange program opportunities through the north2north program.

CLASS CHAT: CULTURALLY RESPONSIVE TEACHING FOR STUDENT SUCCESS BY CHRISTINA INGRAM, ELS ASSOCIATE

Drawing on Gevena Gay's notion of Culturally Responsive Teaching (CRT), which is particularly useful in English for Academic Purposes (EAP) contexts, I created a unit on learning styles that culminated in a writing assignment for English Language Studies (ELS) Level 50 students at UNBC in the fall of 2014. CRT is the idea that culture is inseparable from teaching and learning (G. Gay, 2000)*,

and that both the instructor and the students inevitably bring their culture with them into the classroom (T. Guy, 2009)*. Consequently, CRT suggests that instructors should find ways to incorporate diverse teaching techniques in order to appeal to the diverse learning styles of their students.

This makes teaching in EAP contexts challenging since the purpose of EAP is to pre-

pare students for academic study, for which they may have no previous experience. Using CRT in an EAP context, my colleague, Kefyn Watkins, and I coordinated with the Academic Success Centre to help students understand their unique learning styles, which helped to enhance their writing and study skills. *references available by request

INTERNATIONAL TRENDS: BCCIE REPORT BY RICHARD FOO, INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT OFFICER

At BCCIE's recent summer session, IE learnt that BC's leading international student sources are mostly from China, India, Saudi Arabia, South Korea and Japan. Since 2003, international inbound students have increased by 50%. However, these sources also send many students to other major education desti-

nations such as: United
States, Australia, and United
Kingdom. With increasing
competition from these major
education destinations, BC
universities that have benefitted from positive core competition factors, including high
standards and quality programs, the attractiveness of
BC (and Canada) as a study

destination, and competitive tuition fees, are now under tremendous pressure. Furthermore, today's international students (along with their agents) are increasingly tech and research savvy. The top three student decision drivers are cost, ranking and social media presence. BC universities who adopt their

international admission and recruitment strategy to the changing international land-scape and student's decisions factors will be well positioned to be a leading international student destination.

FEATURED PARTNER: ROSKILDE UNIVERSITY, DENMARK

Roskilde University (RUC) is a Danish public university founded in 1972. Situated in the town of Roskilde, approximately 30 km west of the Danish capital, Copenhagen, RUC is home to over 9500 students and is the fifthlargest university in Denmark. Students enrolled at the university typically live in Copenhagen and commute to Roskilde by a 20-30 minute train ride.

RUC was established as an alternative to traditional Danish Universities and is wellknown for its liberal arts program and extensive collaborative projects. RUC promotes interdisciplinary experiential learning and less-well defined boundaries between academic fields.

An academic exchange partner with UNBC since 2002, RUC and UNBC have recently renewed a bilateral student exchange agreement. RUC has sent UNBC 18 Danish students over the course of the agreement.

UNBC liberal arts students should consider going on a RUC exchange to Denmark.

GLOBAL KOREA Scholarship

Beginning in 2010, The Global Korea Scholarship (GKS), seeks to encourage International students to attend academic programs in Korea. Run by the Korean Government, the GKS issues monetary awards to individual students to help offset the cost of going abroad. The scholarship program is being offered again in 2016 and UNBC students should consider Korea as an exchange destination option. This year, UNBC student Alisha Alger was the recipient of this prestigious award.
