TRAVEL

- ♦ Neil Hanlon was invited to give a presentation on research he is doing in northern BC as part of the Workshop for Northern Health Authorities in Western Provinces. The workshop was held on 21-22 January 2005 in Saskatoon and was organized by the Canadian Centre for Analysis of Regionalization and Health.
- ♦ Hugues Massicotte (UNBC) served as one of two external experts to review the progress of the "Centre d'Etudes Nordiques", one of the largest research institute at Université Laval. Their mandate is multidisciplinary northern research (plant and microbial ecology, geology, permafrost, climate change, oceanography, wild-life ecology, etc.). The panel was formed of 3 FQRNT administrators and 2 external experts, and was mandated by FQRNT, a research foundation in the province of Québec, which offers considerable infrastructure support to that institute.
