# Chief Roland Willson West Moberly First Nations "I Want to Eat Caribou Before I Die": A Community's Struggle to Protect the Last 11 Caribou from a Coal Mine

Our Elders passed a traditional law to protect caribou as a result of the impacts from the W.A.C. Bennett hydroelectric dam and the foreseeable impacts from industrial activities. Since this conservation measure was implemented our hunters have refrained from harvesting caribou in accordance to the Dunne-za traditional seasonal round. Nearly a half-century later, Canada passed a similar law: the Species at Risk Act. It defined caribou as a "threatened" species, which means a recovery plan is to be implemented no later than 2007. In this presentation, I will discuss the significance of caribou to my people, the Provincial Government of British Columbia's approach to allow mining, oil & gas, and



windfarms to destroy critical habitat and its refusal to implement a recovery plan, and my community's legal battle to try and protect the species from extinction.

# Ken Otter PhD Associate Professor, ESM Assessing the Conflict between Bird Migration and Wind Development in the BC Rockies

Since the late 1990s, BC's hydro-based energy production has not kept pace with demand, and the province has been exploring alternate means of energy generation. The lower Peace Region in north-eastern BC in particular is heavily prospected for wind development. However, these foothills in the eastern Rockies lie along significant animal migration corridors and the mountainous topography of the region has the potential to funnel migrating birds into the same landscapes where wind turbines are proposed. I will be presenting data from both radar and visual tracking on bird movement through the Dokie Wind Development near Moberly Lake, and how an understanding of movement patterns helps assess the potential for conflict at this and other installations.
