Understanding Forests, Carbon, and Climate Change

In March, the Pacific Institute for Climate Solutions, UNBC and the BC Year of Science hosted workshops in Prince George and Terrace to help uncover the new opportunities provided by our forests. The workshops started by asking the question; what is wood? Understanding the basic processes of a growing forest helps to understand the important relationship they hold with climate change. Why biomass fuel from forest wastes is considered carbon neutral was also discussed along with the issue of forest sustainability.

Following an explanation of what biofuels from wood is the workshop changed focus to carbon offsets from forestry. Carbon offsets can be created by using bioenergy instead of traditional fossil fuels and also by growing trees to absorb and sequester carbon dioxide from the air. To this end, the final section of the workshops answered the question; how much carbon is in this tree? One last workshop will be held at UNBC in May directed towards high school students in grades 11 and 12 — stay tuned for details!
