TRAVEL

Gail Fondahl (GEOG) served as co-organizer, along with Natalia Novikova of the Institute of Ethnology and Anthropology (Russian Academy of Sciences, Moscow) for the 5th International Summer School in Legal Anthropology, on *Self-Government and Co-management: Prospects for the Indigenous Peoples of Russia's North.* The summer school was held in the western Siberian city (and oil centre) of Khanty-Mansiysk, from August 6 -11. **Rick Krehbiel** (ENPL Adjunct), **Pam Tobin** (MA NRES GEOG, now working with **Dr. Laurie Chan**), Richard Binder from the Inuvialuit Joint Secretariat and Gail presented talks on co-management, impact benefit agreements and resource revenue sharing, and cultural dimensions of EIAs. The summer school involved 30 students (comprised of undergradute and graduate students and indigenous activists), and 8 lecturers (lawyers, anthropologists, geographers from Russia and Canada).
