

Nursing Practice in Rural and Remote Canada II Nova Scotia

Research Question

What is the nature of nursing practice in rural and remote Canada?

378 out of 797 Nova Scotia nurses responded to the RRNII survey, 56% were RNs

Survey Methods

Survey mailed to 9, 622 eligible nurses (RNs, NPs, RPNs, LPNs)

All nurses in the territories & stratified systematic sample in every province

Canada-wide response rate: 40% (N=3,822) Nova Scotia response rate: 47% (N=378)

96% are female

65% are employed in a full-time/ permanent position

52% live in their primary work community

37% are 55 years of age or older

LPNs 100% Diploma 63% Hospital

(43% NPs, 23% of RNs, 17% of LPNs)


Of these nurses:

Rural NS Recruitment Factors



Professional: advanced practice opportunities; career; interest in practice setting, **Job-Related:** benefits; flexibility of work; income, **Personal & Community**: spouse employment/transfer; family or friends; lifestyle; location

Take Home Messages

- -Rural NS nurses were more likely to work in hospitals than rural Canada nurses overall
- -Rural NS nurses were older than rural nurses in Canada overall, especially RNs
- -The large majority of rural NS nurses reported working within their licensed scope of practice
- -A greater proportion of rural NS nurses held a permanent full-time position compared to rural Canada nurses overall
- -This study makes an important contribution by providing a comprehensive overview of rural and remote nurses' practice and communities within each Canadian prvince and territory
