Research Question

What is the nature of nursing practice in rural and remote Canada?

> **219 out of 500 Yukon nurses** responded to the **RRNII** survey, 77% were RNs


Survey Methods

Survey mailed to 9, 622 eligible nurses (RNs, NPs, RPNs, LPNs)

All nurses in the territories & stratified systematic sample in every province

Canada-wide response rate: 40% (N=3,822) YK response rate: 44% (N=219)






YK Nurse Recruitment Factors

Take Home Messages

-YK nurses were more likely to hold a casual position than rural Canada nurses

Professional Job-related Personal & Community



Professional: advanced practice opportunities; career; interest in practice setting, **Job-Related:** benefits; flexibility of work; income, **Personal & Community**: spouse employment/transfer; family or friends; lifestyle; location

-YK RNs were slightly younger and more likely to hold a bachelor's degree as their highest credential in comparison to rural Canada RNs

-A greater proportion of YK RNs held a rural and remote certificate than rural RNs in Canada overall

-YK nurses were less likely to work in a hospital setting and more likely to work in a community health setting than rural Canada nurses

-This study makes an important contribution by providing a comprehensive overview of rural and remote nurses' practice and communities within each Canadian province and territory
