## Metis in the Margins?: Louis Riel, Montreal and Colonial Education

September 22, 2023

Louis Riel is one of Canada's most famous political figures. Many know him as a leader of the Metis Resistance at Red River in 1869 and again at Batoche in 1885. He was eventually executed for treason by the Canadian government. However, Riel's reputation as a "rebel" obscures his more complex role in the project of building the Canadian nation-state. This talk presents a fine-grained study of Riel's education at the Sulpician College in Montreal from 1856-1864 to illustrate s<mark>ome of that comple</mark>xity. Archival traces show that Riel integrated well into the student body, that he was a leader, and had literary ambitions. My research in the archives of the Sulpicians revealed a manuscript of Riel's graduation speech, given as an upper-level philosophy student, that provides an opp<mark>ortunity to examine how this young Metis man managed</mark> colonial education. Through Riel's education in Montreal this essay illustrates some of the tensions of empire in nineteenth-century colonial British North America.
