Erin Baines presents: Inter-generational memory and children born of war

Kacel pi Nippo (Together in Memory) is a series of testimonial tapestries created by women following their abduction, forced marriage, and pregnancy during the war in northern Uganda. The tapestry maker's children, born in captivity, supported their mothers in the planning, design and making of the tapestries, recording visual, narrative, and audio to document the process. The collective process of rolling, varnishing, and fashioning handmade paper beads into tapestries is a modality intergenerational witnessing, wonder and speculation. Together, we explore the transformative possibilities of such creative memory labours, wherein the youth bear witness to events that proceeded their birth.
