UNBC invites applications for a Senior Laboratory Instructor (Nursing Education) in the School of Nursing, North East Campus, with an anticipated start date of January 1, 2020. UNBC provides broad support for faculty to develop their research and teaching capabilities, a strong mandate for growth, a modern and comprehensive campus, and a distinctive quality of life in northern British Columbia. Nursing Education at UNBC includes a Rural Certificate in Nursing, a collaborative BScN degree offered in conjunction with the College of New Caledonia (Prince George and Quesnel) and Coast Mountain College in Terrace, a MScN degree with thesis or project options and a MSc-FNP degree

The Senior Laboratory Instructor II (Nursing Education – North East campus) position will assist with launching a new Nursing degree at our Fort St. John campus. The Northern Baccalaureate Nursing Program (NBNP) is a proposed Year 3-4 level, Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BScN) degree, combining theoretical and clinical coursework delivered over five consecutive semesters. Students will have completed 60 university transfer credits prior to a competitive admission process.

This position is responsible for instruction in clinical venues; small group teaching in tutorials, labs, seminars and workshops; contributing to classroom teaching and student assessment; and participation in curriculum and course development. The opportunity to instruct theory based courses is possible for qualified candidates with subject matter expertise. The Senior Laboratory Instructor II (Nursing Education) is expected to engage in continuing professional development and scholarly activities, along with service to the University, community and profession. The candidate will have the opportunity to teach in multiple modalities.

The successful applicant for the position will hold and maintain a Registered Nurse designation with a BScN and a Master's degree preferred, along with a minimum of five years clinical nursing experience and interest and experience in clinical teaching. The Nursing Program is particularly seeking RNs who have demonstrated, current clinical expertise in the following areas of nursing: high acuity, acute care, paediatrics and rural health. Evidence of continuing professional development and/or scholarship is required. The successful applicant must demonstrate a high level of communication and interpersonal and teamwork skills, and able to work collaboratively with faculty, students and health service agencies. Candidates will present a record of teaching excellence. Some travel by road and air to regional campuses and northern communities is required. Registration with the CRNBC and a valid BC driver's license are required.
