Definitions and Assumptions

- **Assumption**: Canada has an unsavory colonial past. While there are examples of some individuals acting in accordance with Indigenous values and ways of life at the time of colonization, the overall attitude and actions of European settlers and the political and legal institutions they were creating were rooted in cultural chauvinism. This cultural chauvinism is still around today.
- **Colonization**: "The act of setting up a colony away from ones place of origin"...
- **Decolonization**: A process done at personal, familial, community or national level. Rooted in Indigenous framework. Working towards self-determination. Political or personal.

Definitions and Assumptions

- **IRSS**: Schools erected for social and political reasons namely to aid in state building. Aim to eradicate Indigenous people through a process of assimilation. Stories of abuse.
- **Emancipatory**: research that seeks to empower the subjects. Criticizes traditional research practices for objectifying the participants
- Truth-Telling: A process that aims to shed light on a history and in doing so reveals an ignored or erroneous one

A Personal Process

- Questioning Canada's relationship with the original inhabitants of this land
- Frustrated by degree of (willful?, convenient?) ignorance among friends and acquaintances

A Personal Process

- Motivation to act:
- 1. Interested in justice and fairness
- 2. Felt inhibited by bearing the face of the oppressor
- Felt "responsible" to bear witness to the atrocities of colonization and address how I benefit

A Personal Process

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Aim: To bring to light the impacts of the Indian Residential School System in the Town of Sechelt






(Meaningful) Reconciliation

Ask indigenous people about the promises that were made by your ancestors, the commitment that allowed for your existence here, and then decide to honor those promises right here, and right now in the best way that you can."
