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Introduction

In 2019, the College of New Caledonia, Mackenzie Campus, formed a community stakeholders group, successfully applied for a New Horizons grant, and entered a five-year agreement with the Government of Canada. The purpose of the grant is to understand seniors needs and issues in Mackenzie and develop programs and services that enhance quality of life for seniors.

The community stakeholders group includes a wide range of community organizations, including those that provide housing, transportation, recreation, home support, and other services to seniors. One of the stakeholders is the Community Development Institute (CDI) at the University of Northern British Columbia (UNBC). The CDI's role in this partnership is to design and conduct a research and evaluation framework for the "New Horizons Program: Bridging the Gap".

The Mackenzie Seniors Surveys will assist in understanding the current social and economic environment for seniors in Mackenzie and help identify potential gaps and opportunities for programs and services that could enhance quality of life.

The surveys will also help assess the impact of CNC's New Horizons Program on the lives of seniors in Mackenzie.

This survey is the first of a series of surveys to be developed and administered by the CDI as part of CNC's New Horizons program in Mackenzie. All surveys will be submitted to the UNBC Research Ethics Board for review and approval.

Methodology

This survey targeted seniors aged 55 years and older in Mackenzie, BC. Recruitment took place in the form of advertising in various media throughout the community, word of mouth, and communication by "New Horizons Program: Bridging the Gap" stakeholders with their senior clients and networks.

This survey was primarily distributed online. In addition, paper copies were made available in the community, and respondents had the option to conduct the survey via telephone. Participants had to be aged 55 years or older to participate. Responses were collected during the month of May 2021 and part of June 2021.

The Mackenzie senior population aged 55 years and over, as per the Census 2016, comprises around 1,035 residents. This survey received 111 responses, resulting in a response rate of around 11%. The response rate of 11% means a margin of error of 8.79% with a confidence level of 95%.









Respondent Profile

The majority of respondents were longtime residents of Mackenzie with 59% having lived in the community for over 30 years, and only 13% were relative newcomers with less than 10 years in Mackenzie to date.

Almost all respondents lived in small households; close to 70% lived in two-person households and another 27% lived by themselves.

Gender distribution in the respondent sample was close to three-quarters female and one-quarter male.

As shown in Figure 1, while a breadth of senior age groups was represented in the respondent sample, the majority were aged 60 to 74 years.

In terms of marital status, 62% of the sample were married and the next largest group were widowed (23%).

Close to two-thirds of respondents indicated they were retired. Of the 36% still active in the workforce, most still worked full-time year-round (70%).



Survey Results

Mackenzie as a place to retire



The first section of this survey inquired about Mackenzie seniors' opinions regarding Mackenzie as a community suited for retirement.

A total of 80% of respondents considered Mackenzie a good place to retire (see Figure 2).

At 54%, a little over one-half thought it was a better place to retire at the time of the survey than it had been five years ago.

Finally, 64% indicated they would recommend Mackenzie to family and friends as a place to retire.

Community activities in general

When asked about availability of community activities in Mackenzie, 64% of respondents, or almost two-thirds, thought there were a large number of activities (Figure 3).

Just under 60% indicated that they participated in a number of those community activities, and just over 60% were volunteering with community activities.



Community activities for seniors



In comparison, Figure 4 shows that 45% of respondents agreed or strongly agreed that there were a large number of activities for seniors in Mackenzie. Close to one-quarter, disagreed or strongly disagreed, seeing a shortage of activities targeting seniors.

Forty percent of respondents participated in activities for seniors, and another close to one-quarter of respondents gave a neutral answer, possibly indicating occasional participation.

Close to one-third of respondents were volunteers with seniors' activities in Mackenzie.


Personal networks

Almost all respondents (94%) said that they had family and friends in Mackenzie, indicating the existence of personal social networks for seniors in the community. Figure 5 shows that their network of family and friends are reasons to stay in Mackenzie for 67% of respondents.

A total of 90% agreed or strongly agreed that they had family and friends in the community who would help them out when they needed assistance.

Similarly, 88% indicated that they had family and friends who counted on them when in need of assistance.











Community attitudes



When asked whether people cared about one another in Mackenzie in general, 92% agreed and strongly agreed. In comparison, fewer people felt that the community cared about them, in particular, as seniors (76%).

As shown in Figure 6, 69% agreed or strongly agreed that Mackenzie respects and values its seniors, with another 20% neither agreeing nor disagreeing.

Conclusion

The proportion of seniors in Mackenzie has been steadily increasing for many years, and by 2016, the population aged 55 years and older made up well over one-quarter of the community's total population. Mackenzie is perceived by its seniors as a caring community in general and one that values its seniors; however, the numbers indicate that seniors feel that their generation may not always be prioritized enough. The majority of seniors consider Mackenzie a community that is well-suited to retirement, has improved life for seniors over the past five years, and is a community that has a lot to offer to keep its residents busy. At the same time, however, the responses suggest again that seniors feel that their generation is somewhat neglected in regards to activity options. Almost all seniors have close social ties in the community. Furthermore, respondents indicated that they have people in the community they can count on for help and support when they need it and that they are also in the position of providing help and support to others. The sense of belonging felt by seniors and the strong social ties that support and bind them to the community are clear strengths of the Mackenzie seniors population.
