

Essay Exam Questions

Understand the Question

Underline key action words like <u>analyze</u>, <u>compare</u>, or <u>justify</u> to clarify what the question is asking. This helps you stay focused and tailor your response to the task.




Know the Common Task Words

- Each prompt word requires a different approach.
- For example:
 - Define asks for clarity.
 - Evaluate needs evidence judgment.
 - Discuss calls for balanced analysis.
- Recognizing these helps you respond appropriately and avoid missing the point.

Flip to the back for more examples of task words



- Use concept mapping or jot down key ideas to organize your thoughts under pressure.
- Practicing timed essays ahead of exams can improve your speed and confidence.




Make an Outline

- Outlining helps structure your essay, keep your arguments clear, and ensure you include all key points.
- If you run out of time, a strong outline can often still earn you partial marks.



Write Clearly and Directly

- Start with a focused opening that includes part of the question to stay on topic.
- Keep your writing clear, avoid unnecessary details, and ensure your handwriting is legible.

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Common Task Words

ANALYZE	Break into detailed parts. Discuss or interpret each part.
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COMPARE Examine two or more things. Identify similarities and differences.

Show differences between two or more items. Set in opposition. CONTRAST

Make judgments. Evaluate the worth of the subject. Criticism involves CRITICIZE

analysis and evaluation.

Explain the exact meaning of the term in relation to the course or DEFINE

subject. Determine the exact limits of the term.

DESCRIBE Give a detailed account. List characteristics, qualities, and parts.

DISCUSS Consider and debate the pros and cons of an issue. Evaluate and justify.

Give your opinion or judgement or cite the opinions of experts. Include **EVALUATE**

evidence to support the evaluation. Draw a conclusion.

Clarify an idea. Show logically how a concept is developed. Give the **EXPLAIN**

reasons for an event.

ILLUSTRATE Explain, clarify, or support using examples.

Explain the meaning. Describe, show relationships, comment on, and INTERPRET

evaluate.

Argue in support of a decision or conclusion. Show that there is JUSTIFY

sufficient evidence and reason in favour of something. Support your

argument with facts, logical reasoning, and examples.

List several ideas, aspects, events, things, qualities, reasons, etc. LIST

(Enumerate means the same thing.)

OUTLINE Describe main ideas, characteristics, or events.

Show the connections between ideas or events. Provide a larger RELATE

context.
