

HUMANITIES & SOCIAL SCIENCE REQUIREMENT: 90 credit hours (including 30 at the upper level) must consist of Humanities and Social Science courses. When selecting coursework above, 30 credits of coursework can be used from outside the Humanities and Social Science list; however, students must ensure that they build in the appropriate coursework to meet the Humanities and Social Science requirement. Students should consider that they will need to take lower division coursework sufficient to advance them to the upper division as half the degree requirements are at the 300/400 level. Please review the course list in the Academic Calendar of coursework that is considered Humanities or Social Science. Coursework from other areas may be approved on a case-by-case basis depending on its content. Please see your Student Advisor for details.

BREADTH REQUIREMENT: As a part of this program, students will have typically satisfied their Arts & Humanities and Social Sciences breadth requirements however you will want to make sure that you have taken appropriate coursework (see note in the chart above*). Outside of that, students need to take a three-credit course in each of the following areas: Natural Sciences and Physical Science to meet the Academic Breadth requirement.

Advisor Notes

COURSE PLANNING: For your first year of study, the recommended courses are listed above. After that, students should utilize their Academic Calendar along with their <u>Degree Evaluation</u>, a tool that interprets the Undergraduate Calendar for the year that you were admitted and helps display the requirements needed for your program. You can also always connect with your Student Advisor for help with course planning. Students should consult the Undergraduate Calendar for course descriptions and pre/co-requisites, <u>www.unbc.ca/calendar</u>.

UNIV 103: It is highly recommended for students in first year to take UNIV 103 – Introduction to Indigenous Studies, Social Sciences and Humanities as an elective in first year. This courses provides an introduction to academic inquiry, focusing on the development of critical thinking, reading and university writing including foundational study skills and learning strategies. This course also introduces university services and resources available to support student success.

TIME LIMIT: Except by permission of the Dean, students must complete their undergraduate degree program within 15 years of their first semester of registration.

RESIDENCY REQUIREMENT: Students must complete a minimum of 30 credit hours of upper division UNBC coursework to receive a UNBC degree.

TRANSFER & RETURNING STUDENTS: Please consult with your Student Advisor to determine how your previous work may best be applied to the program requirements. When registering for coursework pay close attention to the course preclusions to ensure you are not registering in duplicate coursework.

MINORS: To see available minors, please refer to the <u>Declaration of Minor form</u> or look in the Program pages of the <u>Undergraduate Calendar</u>. Minors are a structured way to use your electives while also completing a secondary concentration and are suggested for students in the BA General program.
