ENGLISH UPPER DIVISION REQUIREMENT: Of the 39 credit hours of English required for the Joint major, at least seven courses (21 credit hours) must be at the 300/400 level with 6 credits of those at the 400 level specifically. Students need to choose coursework accordingly to make sure that they are meeting this requirement.

BREADTH REQUIREMENT: As a part of this program, students will have satisfied the Arts & Humanities breadth requirements (with the required ENGL or HIST courses). As such, please take a three credit course in Physical Science, a three credit course in Natural Sciences, and a three credit course in Social Sciences to meet the [breadth requirement](#).

Advisor Notes

COURSE PLANNING: For your first year of study, the recommended courses are listed above. After that, students should utilize their Academic Calendar along with their [Degree Evaluation](#), a tool that interprets the Undergraduate Calendar for the year that you were admitted and helps display the requirements needed for your program. You can also always connect with your Student Advisor for help with course planning. Students should consult the Undergraduate Calendar for course descriptions and pre/co-requisites, www.unbc.ca/calendar.

ELECTIVES: Your first year is structured to have lots of opportunity to explore with electives! We encourage students to take a wide variety of courses they are interested in. A minor is a great way to concentrate your electives. Talk with your Student Advisor for suggestions!

UNIV 103: It is highly recommended for students in first year to take UNIV 103 – Introduction to Indigenous Studies, Social Sciences and Humanities as an elective in first year. This course provides an introduction to academic inquiry, focusing on the development of critical thinking, reading and university writing including foundational study skills and learning strategies. This course also introduces university services and resources available to support student success.

TIME LIMIT: Except by permission of the Dean, students must complete their undergraduate degree program within 15 years of their first semester of registration.

RESIDENCY REQUIREMENT: Students must complete a minimum of 30 credit hours of upper division UNBC coursework to receive a UNBC degree.

TRANSFER & RETURNING STUDENTS: Please consult with your Student Advisor to determine how your previous work may best be applied to the program requirements. When registering for coursework pay close attention to the course preclusions to ensure you are not registering in duplicate coursework.

DOUBLE MAJORS: Students who are considering a double major should speak with their Student Advisor as soon as possible.

MINORS: To see available minors, please refer to the [Declaration of Minor form](#) or look in the Program pages of the [Undergraduate Calendar](#). Minors are a structured way to use your electives while also completing a secondary concentration.
