Tumbler Ridge to Develop a Community Sustainability Plan

Since its creation in 1984, Tumbler Ridge has experienced the benefits and challenges of being a resource economy community. It began as an "instant" town with new infrastructure and modern community design, a young energetic population, plentiful jobs, and diverse community programs and services.

When the global market for coal collapsed in 2003, change came quickly and unexpectedly. As a result, the community faced a number of significant challenges around jobs, housing, retail services, health and social services, and municipal infrastructure. However, the spirit of the community remained within a core group of dedicated residents and leaders who kept many community programs active.

With the recent resurgence of coal prices, the community is again on the upswing. This prompted the District of Tumbler Ridge Council to undertake the development of a community sustainability plan. "The Tumbler Ridge Sustainability Plan is a proactive response, and a determined resolve not to let history repeat itself, regardless of the inevitable fluctuations in the resource economy," said Mayor Darwin Wren.

Tumbler Ridge is working with the CDI to develop the community sustainability plan through a local committee, chaired by Councillor Mike Caisley.

"Tumbler Ridge is preparing to take full advantage of the current economic upswing to create lasting benefit for the community," said Marleen Morris, Associate Director of the CDI. Prince George Housing Need and Demand Study and Housing Strategy Framework

Last year, the City of Prince George adopted a new Official Community Plan (OCP) which includes the goal of creating a range of housing types and tenures to accommodate all ages, income levels, and abilities. The OCP also highlights the need to strengthen neighbourhoods, facilitate infill and redevelopment, and minimize ongoing costs of infrastructure.

To further the housing agenda, the City of Prince George has partnered with the CDI to complete a housing need and demand study and a housing strategy framework.

"Our goal is to have a robust and diverse housing supply that aligns with economic growth and diversification opportunities," said Chris Bone, Manager of Communication and Citizen Engagement and the City's lead on this project. "We want to have housing that meets the needs and provides options for the full range of Prince George residents."

In addition to understanding current and future housing need and demand, the project will create a platform for dialogue that positions all segments of the housing sector in Prince George to take advantage of opportunities as they arise.

"Good housing and vibrant neighbourhoods will attract new residents, support economic development and community revitalization, and help retain existing residents, especially seniors," said Greg Halseth, Director of the CDI. "With the anticipated economic growth and investment in the north, Prince George must be ready to take advantage of opportunities to strengthen its role as a hub for the region."

Volunteerism and Aging in Northern BC Communities

Working as part of a cross-Canada research partnership, the CDI is studying volunteerism in resource communities.

This research project examines the role that voluntary organizations, community groups, and volunteers play in both supporting older people and in influencing community development. It also examines the role of seniors in providing volunteer services and programs, and how this contribution is making a difference in volunteer organizations and community development initiatives.

Two communities, Quesnel and Tumbler Ridge, are participating in the study. The northern BC work is led by CDI faculty associate, Neil Hanlon and CDI Director, Greg Halseth, in collaboration with project lead Mark Skinner at Trent University and Alun Joseph at the University of Guelph.

Youth on Boards, Prince George
