Beyond research, the Institute is involved in outreach activities and serves as a conduit to expand local educational opportunities related to community development.

Projects

Tourism and Development Foundation Project

Between May and September of 2005, staff at the Community Development Institute along with faculty members of UNBC's Resource Recreation and Tourism Program will be developing new connections and relationships with organizations in the tourism sector. Our research has shown that tourism plays an important but little studied part of Northern BC's economy. The Tourism and Development Foundation Project will probe opportunities and challenges for the tourism sector and will create a foundation of knowledge to support new economic development work.

To begin, data will be collected and interviews conducted with economic development and tourism industry actors across northern BC. The interviews will be conducted in communities from 100 Mile House to Atlin and from the Alberta border to the Queen Charlotte Islands. As we identify core issues supporting and challenging economic development opportunities in the tourism sector, we will be building a solid foundation to support more detailed research on creating economic development across the region. This project builds upon the work of the Community Development Institute through the Northern BC Economic Development Vision and Strategy Project that has been underway for the past two years.

Community Forestry Guidebook

BC's Forest Research Extension Partnership (FORREX) is a charitable non-share corporation, linking people to knowledge, and facilitating continuing innovation and improvement in natural resource policy and management. Along with the British Columbia Community Forestry Association, FORREX recently produced "Community Forestry Guidebook: Tools and Techniques for Communities in British Columbia." The Guidebook is intended as a practical guide for communities and organizations interested in applying for community forest licenses or launching community forestry programs; its content is targeted at municipalities, community organizations, and First Nations in BC. Community Forestry is introduced to be 'about local control over and enjoyment of the monetary and non-monetary benefits offered by local forest resources.'

Cariboo-Chilcotin Beetle Action Coalition

The Cariboo-Chilcotin Beetle Action Coalition, chaired by Williams Lake Mayor Rick Gibson, will focus on developing long-term local solutions to the pine beetle epidemic. Three key areas the Coalition intends to pursue include land base issues, economic development and communications. Recently having received an initial \$800,000 grant from the provincial government, the Coalition is expected to develop community-based strategies that will be transferable to other regions.
