#### **Current Projects**

#### **Tourism and Development Foundation Project**

Between May and October of 2005, CDI staff along with faculty from UNBC's Resource Recreation and Tourism Program developed new connections with organizations in the tourism sector. Our research has shown that tourism plays an important but little studied part of northern BC's economy. Building upon the Northern BC Economic Development Vision and Strategy Project, and with funding support from Western Economic Diversification Canada, this project explored some of the opportunities and challenges for the tourism sector and has drafted a set of

#### **Community Connections**

This summer was the third in a row that the CDI continued its dialogue with as many community representatives as possible throughout UNBC's service region. Both formal and informal discussions have been taking place with government, industry, labour, small business, First Nations, economic development organizations, and community groups. The purpose is to add to our knowledge of what has gone on in the past, what is going on presently, and what people feel needs to be the focus going into the future. The CDI is using this community foundation to build collaborative research projects and collect rare community development documents for its intended resource library.

#### **New Projects**

#### **Terrace Seniors Dialogue**

The CDI will be assisting the City of Terrace to examine seniors' issues and needs. This is a scoping project to create a foundation of information for a more detailed future study of seniors' issues in the greater Terrace area. It is expected that the future study would also include both short and long-term recommendations for a plan to deal with those issues. The current project will involve an analysis of local population trends, interviews with seniors, decision-makers, and service providers, and focus groups to explore the housing, services, and quality of life topics. The work will be carried out between January and March 2006.

#### Old Massett Village Council 5 Year Human Resources Strategic Plan

The CDI is pleased to offer assistance to the Old Massett Village Council as they develop a "5 Year Human Resources Strategic Plan". The project involves a community-driven process to explore local skills and training capacity and to identify the potential skills development, education, and training resources needed to meet the needs of future employment opportunities. The goal is to create a strategic plan for the Old Massett community. The project is funded by Service Canada and is managed by John Disney, Economic Development Officer for Old Massett Village Council.

#### **Institute News**

#### **Speaker's Series**

Last year, the CDI, in partnership with communities and funding agencies, sponsored two Community Speakers. In the Spring, SFU researcher Sean Markey spoke in Prince George, Terrace, and Kitimat. In the Fall, Tourism BC's Director of Research Richard Porges spoke in Prince George and Williams Lake. The Speakers series invites experts to talk on important and relevant topics for northern BC. The Speakers series consists of classroom lectures at UNBC, a public lecture in Prince George, and a public talk in another northern BC community.
