"Given recent research suggesting that rural and small town places in northern BC are looking to collaborate in regions to increase their competitive advantage, I am exploring regional approaches to community and economic development in the Cariboo-Chilcotin for my master's thesis. I want to understand contemporary regional approaches to development in the larger context of Canadian rural and regional development trends. I am also looking to understand some key factors which may facilitate regional collaboration, such as social cohesion and social capital, neoliberal provincial policy, or the reaction to economic and environmental change. Upon completion of this research, I will provide decision-makers and community groups with a copy of my findings.

"My research area is the Peace River Region in North Eastern British Columbia and looks primarily at how health services can serve as a foundation for community development. My thesis explores issues around the recruitment and retention of health care professionals, access to health services, and the distribution of the decision making that effects service provision. This thesis aims at highlighting positive relationships between the communities and the health service sector: as well as suggesting possible methods for enhancing the health service capability and access through community development. When complete, the

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research findings will be presented to the communities in the region.

Space to Place: The Next Rural Economies Workshop, May 14-17, 2008 in Prince George, BC

Within all developed economies we find that rural and small town communities are experiencing considerable change. They are changing as a result of resource industry restructuring, demographic aging and youth out-migration, the restructuring of both public and private sector services, and the ongoing implications of urbanization. Within this context, communities and policy makers are working to meet challenges and take advantage of new opportunities. To be effective, both local and public policy decision makers need a clear understanding of the pressures driving change, the opportunities inherent in such changes, and the creative responses of similar rural and small town areas. To this end, the Community Development Institute at the University of Northern BC (UNBC) and the Enterprise Program at Simon Fraser University (SFU) are co-hosting "Space to Place: The Next Rural Economies Workshop" to be held in Prince George from May 14-17, 2008.

This workshop brings together twenty-six rural and small town scholars from ten OECD countries to discuss possibilities about what our next rural economies will look like. Older approaches to community and economic development focused upon a 'space-economy' with attention to comparative advantages and overcoming the cost of distances. This approach is being replaced by recognition of the growing importance of 'place-based economies' where the unique attributes and assets of individual places now determine its attractiveness for particular types of activities and investments.
