The Executive Summary Report provides a brief introduction to the CCBAC Coalition and the substantial research that underpins the strategy. It also provides a summary of the expected impacts; stabilization strategies; economic development strategies; the organizational capacity required to implement, monitor, and report on the strategies; and the funds required for of implementation. In addition to the Executive Summary Report, the companion comprehensive report provides extended descriptions and detail in 20 appendices.
