It provided the foundations for regional collaborations, enhanced resource revenue sharing programs, consideration of new energy issues, relationship building among Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal communities, and attention to the key foundations (human, community, physical, and economic) needed to be flexible and responsive in the global economy: http://web.unbc.ca/geography/faculty/greg/research/edvs/index.html In September 2009, the CDI will launch NEV2. Northern Rockies Partnership: Building the Region Together!

Two research institutes at UNBC, together with the Fraser Basin Council, are working to assist the Northern Rockies Regional Municipality (NRRM) with the development, establishment, and initial implementation of a proposed "Northern Rockies Partnership: Building the Region Together!"

Over the last four decades, the Northern Rockies region of north-eastern British Columbia has experienced economic 'boom' and 'bust' situations due to the growth and decline of numerous resource development activities. The Community Development Institute (CDI) and the Natural Resources and Environmental Studies Institute (NRESi) at UNBC are assisting with the creation of a more integrative and collaborative dialogue approach to community and resource development that will bring together regional First Nations communities, natural resource industries, the provincial government, and the NRRM.
