The CDI and Bio-Energy

For the past 6 months, the CDI has been working with a growing number of interested parties in exploring the tertiary opportunities associated with bio-energy and bio-manufacturing – specifically the potential for utilizing "waste heat" for other community purposes. A lot is happening on this topic including very productive meetings with Minister Pat Bell, a presentation to the provincial Bio-Economy Committee, and some site visits. The CDI at the Union of British Columbia Municipalities' Convention

The Union of British Columbia Municipalities' Convention (UBCM) is a province-wide organization that represents the interests of local governments in BC. Each year it holds an annual convention. In 2010, Greg Halseth from UNBC's CDI gave two presentations to the UBCM Convention, and he was invited back again in 2011.

Age-Friendly Communities

With the senior population projected to double over the next 20 years, there is an immediate need for local governments to ensure that they are planning for this aging demographic. Through presentations by provincial and local government officials, this session will offer information and ideas to assist communities in determining how age-friendly they are, what can be done to make their communities more age-friendly, and what resources are available. Best practices and projects will also be shared at this session to motivate local governments to action.
