

Happy New Year from the Cumulative Impacts Research Consortium

Looking back at a year of community dialogue and research on the cumulative environmental, community and health impacts of resource development across northern British Columbia



Summary

This report provides an overview of the research and community engagement activities and funding achievements the UNBC Cumulative Impacts Research Consortium (CIRC) accomplished throughout 2016. Over the next year we will continue to build on past successes by reaching out to communities in northern British Columbia to expand our understanding of the cumulative impacts of resource development across northern BC, respond to knowledge and capacity gaps with original research, and build our capacity to act as a regional hub of cumulative impacts information and resources. As we move forward, we will also continue to seek feedback and take leadership from the communities we work with to better understand the ways in which our research and outreach activities can best support local capacity to address the issue of cumulative impacts.


Workshops and Community Events
