ABSTRACT:

The forest sector and forestdependent communities in many parts of the world are in transition. There is little doubt that the economic situation facing the industry today – from slumping housing markets to globalization - have contributed to and exacerbated this situation. But this is just the tip of the iceberg. This presentation will explore some of the fundamental, underlying reasons at the heart of the current economic crisis. It begins with a consideration of conservation principles and delves into what can best be characterized as a sector-wide myopia with respect to our reliance on commodity products, both in Canada and in other parts of the world. Bigger picture, global issues are discussed, as are paradigms for managing our forests, producing goods and services, operating our businesses, and ultimately, upholding the wellbeing of our rural communities.
