What does it mean to be a Faculty within Canada's Green University?

For the Faculty of Business and Economics, over the past four plus years we have been working toward becoming the Canadian university for learning about business as a tool for sustainable communities.

As part of this process, we have made strategic changes in our curriculum, such as adding four courses in sustainability to the BCOMM program, and strategic changes in our approach to faculty recruitment to add sustainability-focused academics such as Dr. Elisabet Garriga Cots, Associate Professor of Sustainable Business.

In Economics, in addition to adding sustainability-oriented faculty members, we have added the Economic Development Forum, a space where we can discuss the role of economic development in sustainable northern communities.

All of these measures are meant to have a long-term impact on supporting the sustainability of economic development in northern BC.



In the short term, we are also taking concrete action by partnering with Veritree Technology Inc. ("veritree") to fund verified tree-planting projects that restore our planet, enhance livelihoods, sequester carbon, and protect ecosystems.

Currently we are investing in one such project in Senegal. As part of this project, students in the FBE will have access to an impact dashboard, showcasing goals, progress, and restoration details. In this way, students will be able to see best in class ESG reporting, not as an ambiguous academic exercise, but as a real project with real-world impacts. Because sustainability is more than environmentalism.

In the UNBC Faculty of business and Economics, sustainability isn't just something we talk about, it is who we are.
