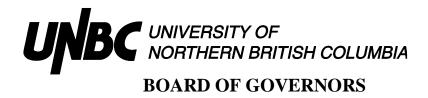

Report for March 2014 – March 2015

Executive Summary

Research was made by the Risk and Safety Manager and the Chief Information Officer into an Emergency Notification System (ENS). A system by Regroup has been selected by several other Universities in Western Canada and their agreement is part of BCNet. This means that UNBC can onboard without the purchase having to go through an RFP process. After further investigation it was discovered that before any MNS could be implemented at UNBC changes needed to be made to the storage of contact information within the Banner database in order that accurate and up to date information could be integrated into the ENS. The ENS project has been placed on hold until this work is nearer to completion. A consultant has attended site to review the upgrade of the exterior emergency telephone system and CCTV security camera system. As these systems are an integral part of the ENS the costs and timelines for this project are also on hold until June 2015.

UNBC hired a new Risk and Safety Coordinator in September. Heath de la Giroday was the Radiation and Chemical Safety Officer for UNBC so entered into this role already fully conversant with UNBC policy and procedures. As a long time employee working in the Safety field of academia Heath brings considerable experience to this role and has already undertaken and provided oversight into two major projects and changes of policy and procedure to ensure regulatory compliance.

The Health and Safety Office continued to provide advice and training for the University community during this period. With consultation and input from the UNBC community the Risk and Safety Coordinator developed a new on-line supervisor safety orientation course for all new and

existing employees and this project is expected to be rolled out in April 2015 through Human Resources.

- **Safety Officer Committee** Regular monthly one on one meetings and joint quarterly meetings held.
- Animal Care and Use Committee (ACUC) Attended meetings and participated in an advisory role.
- College University Safety Association (CUSA) Risk & Safety Coordinator will be attending conference in May 2015
- Numerous

Fire Safety

- Fire drills for the main campus buildings were held in September 2014 and again in February 2015. Overall evacuation by staff and students was expedient with no issues.
- The NSC fire drill was held in August. Evacuation was timely and no issues arose.
- Monthly fire drills continue to be held at the UNBC Daycare.
- Prince George Fire department now requires all fire evacuation plans to be submitted in an electronic format. The Risk and Safety Manager will work with the Director of Facilities to renew the fire evacuation plans for all UNBC sites.

Building Inspections

Buildings on campus are inspected on a monthly rotating basis. Reports are forwarded to Facilities or responsible department/faculty for corrections and follow up. These reports are sent to the Health and Safety Committee for review at their regular meeting.

Ergonomics

The Risk and Safety coordinator is providing general ergonomic assessments in order to help employees with work space setup. For detailed ergonomic assessments involving an injury or medical request, an external resource is required. Ergonomic assessment requests have increased considerably this year.

Chemical Safety

The Lab safety website was completed and now contains up to date lab user information and laboratory safety information. The website functions as a safety guide and reference site, including training information and user forms/tools.

The majority of the NFPA 704 door signage for labs was updated, with a push to update the NFPA 704 ratings Vertere to streamline the process.

Several chemical safety incidents occurred during this period. A chemical container failed in the hazardous materials storage area. A student also spilled some acid in NALS. The low-oxygen alarm for the fluid nitrogen plant was activated. All these incidents and spills were cleaned up using appropriate spill procedures.

The large scale spill kits in the lab buildings were all updated.

A draft lab inspection policy was developed by the Lab Safety Committee to strengthen the laboratory safety program and is currently in the review process.

Radiation Safety

UNBC's consolidated Canadian Nuclear Safety Commission (CNSC) licenses are valid until 2017. These licenses were amended in 2015 to reflect changes in the regulations related to financial guarantees, which has no impact on UNBC as a license holder. Three new internal radioisotope permits were issued in 2015. One permit was allowed to lapse, with the associated isotopes reverting to the custody of the Radiation Safety Officer until they can be disposed of. Training sessions for new users were held on May 30th, 2014 and Nov 3rd, 2014.

Due to the Radiation Safety Committee not having a volunteer chair the Radiation Safety Officer took on the role of chair to ensure that meetings occurred as required under the license conditions

Waste Management

Stericycle remains UNBC's bio hazardous waste disposal contractor. The waste is currently picked-up on an eight week cycle.

A new contract for chemical hazardous waste was signed with Clean Harbours. An annual waste transfer was performed in August 2014, 2014

Material Safety Data Sheets

Access to Material Safety Data Sheets is required for all laboratories. This is maintained through an online subscription through the Canadian Centre for Occupational Health and Safety (CCOHS). All computers on campus have access to the CCOHS MSDS database. For the few laboratories without internet access, MSDS paper copies are required to be available.

Biosafety

The Biosafety officer is in place but we are currently without a designated back up Officer. The Biosafety manual was updated and posted on both the Risk & Safety and Chemical Stores websites.

There were no bio hazardous incidents during this period.

Inspections

The two Level 2 and seven Level 1 Biosafety Labs on campus have been inspected and certified according to CFIA and PHAC standards.

The NMP program working out of the University Hospital of Northern British Columbia (UHNBC) has now been declared as a UNBC work place and registered as such with Worksafe BC. This site is now being included in annual inspection reports.

Training

There were six level 2 Biosafety training sessions given this past year with a total of 50 students and researchers attending. The Biosafety Level1 course on Blackboard was updated and implemented in September 2013. 331 students registered and successfully completed the course. The Biosafety Officer has developed a Standard Operating procedure (SOP) for all autoclaves on campus.

Numerous Joint Health & Safety Committee members attended various training courses provided by Worksafe BC for committee work, investigations and inspections.

Occupational Health & Safety Program.

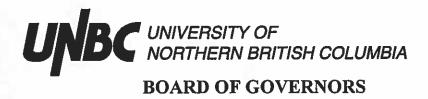
A confined space safety program was developed in the form of a policy with a full set of procedures and documentation in conjunction with Facilities Management. The program addresses regulatory requirements and is administrated by Facilities Management with support from Risk & Safety.

Risk & safety are currently working with Wood Engineering Program to develop a safety program for the new engineering lab space at the Wood Innovation & Design Centre.

The Risk & Safety coordinator provided respirator, lock-out and confined space awareness training for facilities workers in preparation for the 2014 Bioenergy Plant maintenance shutdown.

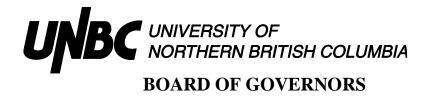

Material:

The attached budget information (*Schedules I-IV*) was developed in mid-February 2015, based on assumptions that were predicated upon a need for the institution to remain stable over the coming fiscal year. This stability is considered essential to provide the new President and Provost the opportunity to engage in academic planning. This strategy has been discussed in several venues with a wide range of institutional audiences, including the Board of Governors.

Given the recent job action and the fact that the job action is currently suspended, not concluded, President's Executive Council (PEC) has determined that the information attached is a best-case scenario for the 2015/16 fiscal year. PEC members are not in a position to estimate the impact job action will have on enrolments in the coming academic year. In the opinion of members, there will be negative consequences. The experiences at other institutions where there has been job action have varied depending upon strike duration and the subsequent decisions related to the academic impact on students. At UNBC, there have already been several periods of declining enrolment; one can only speculate as to how job action may exacerbate that decline for September 2015.

For that reason, the attached estimates are for information and discussion purposes only. A request has been made to the Province to allow the UNBC budget to be deferred to the Board of Governors meeting on May 30th, allowing more time to clarify the situation and develop estimates that have a higher degree of precision.

The attached documents present a budget that is largely the same as last year. Even keeping budget allocations the same, however, comes under pressure from rising costs related to such items as foreign exchange rates, salary increases, and other inflationary pressures. The planning projections included in the November 2014 Budget Planning Framework estimated a deficit just over \$2 million for 2015/16. In order to maintain current operations, the deferral of several recurring transfers is proposed (*see Schedule II: Details of Budgeted Transfers*). Deferral of these transfers is considered to be a viable option because there are sufficient carry forward balances available that will allow the related activities to continue in the 2015/16 fiscal period without an additional transfer of funds. Additional details of the proposed deferrals are provided in *Schedule III: Details of Proposed One-time Adjustments*.

Another item of note is the estimate for tuition revenues. In the 2014/15 fiscal year, enrolment declines of approximately 6% were experienced. In developing the attached information, the allowed inflationary fee increase of 2% was included as a price increase. A decrease in enrolment was also projected to more closely align with current actual enrolment. The estimated decrease was not calculated at 6%, however, allowing for some degree of optimism and potential for turnaround in the coming year. This element of the budget projections will require significant review and deliberation prior to bringing forward a budget for approval at the end of May and will depend on several variables.

The salary and benefit costs have been adjusted to reflect current salary progression plans for all employee groups. Adjustments that may be required related to collective bargaining (for both the Faculty Association and CUPE) are not yet known. In addition, bargaining that is within the provincial mandate is funded; therefore, while there is no adjustment to related revenue and expenses included in the schedules, the impact of those adjustments to the bottom line is expected to be zero. Any necessary changes arising as agreements are finalized will be incorporated in a revised budget and the Board will be updated as required. Salary and benefit costs represent approximately 75% of the university's operating budget.

Remaining expenses have been maintained at historical levels with minor adjustments to reflect known inflationary increases. The current fluctuation in the value of the Canadian dollar may create an issue in the coming year related to the foreign exchange impact on software licensing and other operating costs. The attached information reflects anticipated increases but no other budgetary adjustments have been made in order to maintain stability for planning purposes. To move the university forward, it is of critical importance that budget allocations reflect institutional priorities as articulated through an institutional academic plan.

A budget document will come forward to the Board at the next meeting with additional estimates and assumptions for approval.

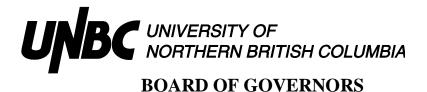

Increased revenues that resulted in a net increase to UNBC's bottom line are the primary financial highlights for 2014/15.

Ancillary Services provides critical internal services for UNBC while making a NET contribution.

If Ancillary Services can continue to provide important services for UNBC, while we continue to grow our annual contribution, then we will consider any given year a complete success.

2015/16 Looking Forward

Continuing Studies (CS) will move online in the spring of 2015. Last year represented a year of investment into developing its online framework. CS is poised to move online during 2015 and to further expand its traditional offerings in the regions. Additional investments into new program development such as the Land Reclamation Certificate will ensure that CS revenues continue to grow.

Conference and Event Services (CES) and the Northern Sport Centre (NSC) played a critical role in successfully implementing the Canada Winter Games. Deb Van Adrichem (Manager CES), Kevin Nowottnick (Manager CES), and Jennifer Studney (CES) and the entire compliment of staff from both CES and the NSC should be recognized for the incredible work they did during this important event for UNBC.

Housing renovations delayed until summer of 2016. Initial costing came back that was too high. As a result it was decided that we would delay the renovations until next summer so we can review and assess our plan.

Service Center will be revealed in 2015/16. The UNBC Bookstore will be changing its approach to providing services on campus. The Service Center will continue to sell textbooks and other general merchandise however it will also provide customer services support for Print Services, Parking, and One Card.

The increased traffic will benefit all retail in the Service Center. Furthermore positioning the bookstore as a Service Center will allow for more efficient use of staff while improving service delivery for the UNBC community.

Comments on Expenditures, Labour & Transfers:

The University of Northern British Columbia's fiscal year is April 1 - March 31. At December 31, it is expected that the variance from budget for most expenditures would be in the range of 25% - 45%. However, since many expenses do not occur evenly during the year, eg. hydro, individual departments are reviewed to identify potential problem areas. Based on this review, no issues requiring Board attention were identified. Because not all expenses have committed values, it is difficult to project the exact totals to year end.

Salaries and benefits are committed to March 31st. However, costs such as casual wages, sick leave replacement, sessional instructor contracts, and overtime vary due to circumstances in each area and are difficult to predict to year end.

Transfers to and from other funds are recorded at various points during the year, with most occurring at the beginning of the year. No issues have been identified in the transfer accounts that will have a significant impact on the total annual financial results.

NOTES TO THE OPERATING STATEMENT

- 1. The 2014/15 Approved Budget comprises the amounts approved at the March 29, 2014 Board meeting.
- 2. The 2014/15 Revised Budget comprises the approved budget plus reallocations and transfers that occur during the fiscal year.
- 3. Student fee revenue represents revenue recorded when a student registers. It does not mean that the fees have been collected. Over the fiscal year the system adjusts student fee revenue as students add or drop courses. At year end an assessment is made to determine whether outstanding fees are collectible. Where they are determined to be doubtful the amount is recorded as bad debt.
- 4. This revenue represents the rent paid to UNBC by Compass Group Canada, National Collaborating Centre for Aboriginal Health, and Rogers Communications for on-campus space, and by other agencies renting space at the University. As well, it includes the chargeback for personnel services provided to the Northern Sport Centre, the 2% of gross sales administration fee charged to Ancillary operations and 15% of gross revenue administration fee charged to the Master of Business Administration program for the administrative and operational (heat, light and power) services provided to them, and an additional \$150,000 contribution from Ancillary operations.
- 5. The budget for salaries and benefits includes \$833,011 in salary savings prorated amongst the various operating areas. The committed amount includes benefits on contractual salaries estimated at 8 to 21.5%.
- 6. Salary budget in University Operations includes estimated costs of: tuition waivers for employees, increases occurring July 1, 2014, and other items under the various employee agreements (e.g. previous year amounts not yet reallocated to units pending conclusion of employee group negotiations), long term leaves such as maternity/parental leaves, and new positions approved in the 2014/15 budget but not yet allocated to the appropriate unit(s), pending completion of the hiring process. This budget is reallocated to the operational areas incurring the expenses during the year. The spending under this category represents the cost of tuition waivers for staff and faculty, any employee severance pay, and administrative leaves.
- 7. The University Operations budget includes the plant operation costs of \$3,354,047.
- 8. Transfers to other funds include such items as transfers to capital, sponsored research, professional development and scholarship funds, as included in the 2014/15 approved budget. These transfers occur at various points during the year.
- 9. Transfers from other funds include such items as transfers from endowments, research funds and the Northern Medical Program, as included in the 2014/15 approved budget. These transfers occur at various points during the year.

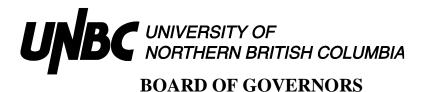

Status:

We are awaiting a consultant report to UBC, MAVED, and UNBC.

2/ Facilities Management building c/w multi-purpose lab

3/ Engineering Program space – Repurposing

Status:

There has been no further activity on this project since the last report.

4/ Sustainable Communities and Bioenergy Expansion

Phase 1 of the project is complete. Planning on phase 2 is continuing and work is expected to begin early April due to the favorable weather. As with all of our capital projects, continued work on these projects is dependent upon the labour dispute being settled.

5/ Residence Renewal

Status:

HCMA Architects continues to refine the design based on a substantially reduced scope of work. IDL was awarded the Construction Management @ Risk contract and is working to refine the work required, identify needed trades and get the construction tenders out this year in preparation for an April 2016 start.

We are currently reviewing the viability of completing the entire project in one year – taking advantage of the 1 year preparation and lead time on the project.

Once these exercises are complete and costed a funding update will be provided to the Board.

6/ International Education and Continuing Studies Building

Status:

The requirement for a building to house these activities has been put on hold. Instead, a proposal to house an International initiative in Vancouver is currently going through the academic approval process. If this should proceed, the need for a building here on campus will be substantially delayed, at the very least.

7/ Charles Jago Northern Sports Centre Expansion

Status:

There has been no further activity on this project since the last report.

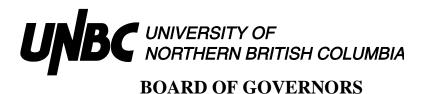

Building:

Purchasing and installation of the Research lab equipment is ongoing. Due to the type and lead time on some of this complex equipment, and the challenges around outfitting the lab as a result of the Canada Winter Games, we asked the Ministry for an extension on this Certificate of Approval past the fiscal year end. An extension for a portion of the funding (\$500,000) was approved last fall. Due to the labour strike, the ability to complete the installation and commissioning of a substantial portion of the equipment has been delayed. A further extension of the funding has been requested – and received. The total deferral into the 2015/16 fiscal year is now \$1,086,349.

During 2014/15 fiscal, the Distributed Program Planning Committee (DPPC) approved a total budget of \$7,494,995 for the NMP site in 2014/15. This is funded as follows:

Since DPPC approval of the overall expanded medical program budget occurs during the year, the budget submission for 2015/16 is based on the 2014/15 revenue level plus utilization of accumulated reserves at the level required to balance the 2015/16 budget. Any adjustments required to revenues, transfers or other accounts as a result of DPPC approval will be completed after the 2015/16 budget submission is approved by DPPC.

Expenditures:

2Salaries & Benefits – By the end of 2015/16 the NMP is expected to have 9 faculty positions (6 FTE Faculty, 1 FTE Librarian and 2 FTE Senior Lab Instructors) and 24.6 FTE staff positions (including the Vice Provost Medicine.) There are a number of funded positions which are filled via stipends or service contracts, which are not included in the position numbers above. Similarly, faculty positions which are tenure track with UBC are not included in the above numbers as they are paid directly by UBC. Clinical Education Leaders (formerly Senior Clinical Faculty) are described in the Clinical Faculty Payments note.

³Clinical Faculty Payments – Payments mainly to physicians and potentially other community members or healthcare professionals who could be involved in teaching. Funding on this line is for 8 FTE Clinical Education Leader positions plus a large number of smaller contracts for clinical faculty payments.

⁴Curriculum Management Fees / Stipends – Payments to those responsible for direction of NMP curriculum, including courses within – Family Practice, Clinical Skills, DPAS, and Foundations of Medicine, as well as to the Clerkship Director, Integrated Site Clerkship Directors (Terrace & Ft. St. John) and the Rural Family Practice Site Director who are responsible for direction of clinical clerkships. Also includes payments for leadership in support of faculty development activities.

⁵**Travel** – Costs of travel for attendance at curriculum delivery and planning meetings, program governance meetings, faculty and staff travel to Vancouver and elsewhere, conference and professional development travel, etc.

⁶**Meetings & Events** – Costs for hosting planning meetings, administrative meetings, special student events such as orientation, recognition events, graduation, etc.

⁷Recruitment, Relocation and Start-up – Costs for bringing in candidates for vacant positions and establishment of faculty start-up funds.

⁸Telephone, Fax and Long Distance – Costs for telephone and other related charges for all units included in the NMP.

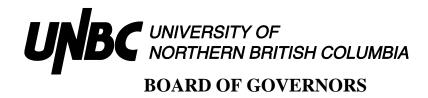
⁹Supplies & Other – Costs for general office supplies and equipment, photocopying and printing, software, books & publications, small furnishings, postage, lab tools and supplies, etc, as well as consulting fees for various contracted services.

¹⁰Minor Capital – Includes an allowance for small audiovisual equipment, office furnishings and equipment, as well as costs for library books and clinical models.

¹¹Transfers – Transfers to General Operating are to cover UNBC overhead for heat, light, maintenance, cleaning, etc. and have historically been based on \$4,000 per student. In 2008, an additional \$1,000 per student was approved on an interim basis and this is included in the budget submission. The Transfers to General Operating also include amounts for specific activities funded by the NMP (e.g. a portion of the Northern Health Sciences Research Facility budget.) Transfers to PD (Professional Development) Reserve are to cover required allowances under various employee agreements.

Transfer from Unspent Funds represents required spending of accumulated reserves, as approved by DPPC, to fund current activities.

Transfers to Internal Research Funds and from Sponsored Research relate to the Canada Research Chair appointment and Michael Smith Foundation for Health Research funding agreement for NMP faculty.

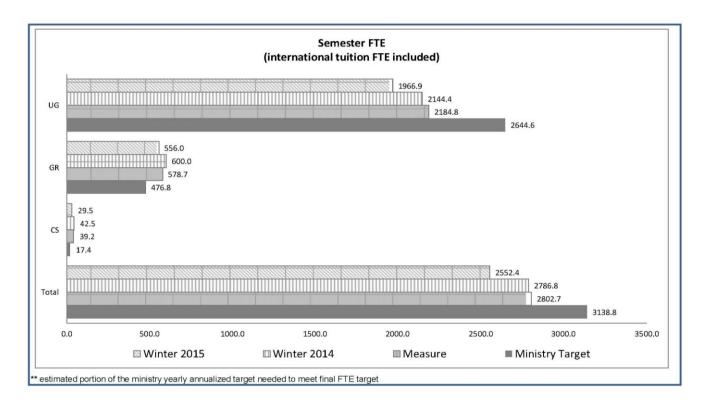

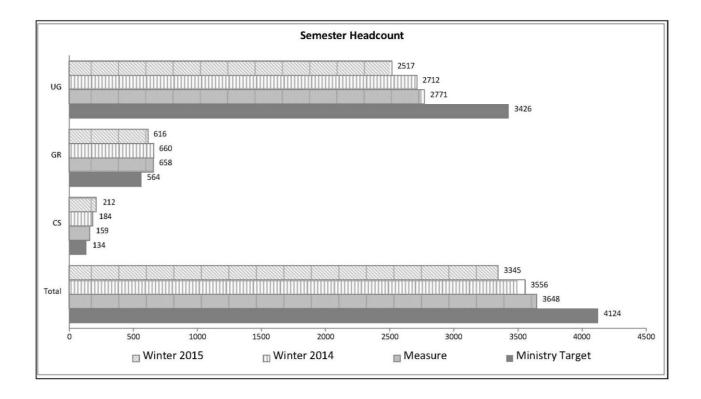

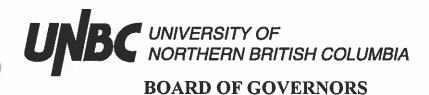

- The ministry targets proved to UNBC includes a portion of "undesignated" FTEs; for the purpose of this report these "undesignated" FTE are used as the targets for continuing studies.

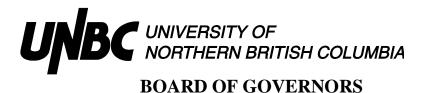

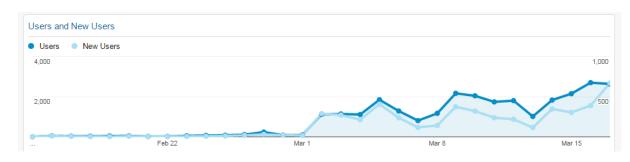
Other Activities to Report from Development

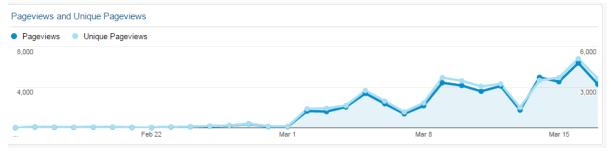
- Fundraising priorities list has been discussed with President's Council and other university chairs/faculty.
- b. 1st Annual Timberwolves Legacy Breakfast was held March 17th with keynote speaker Hayley Wickenheiser. The event was sold out with 380 in attendance including all student athletes, coaches and staff, Mayor and Chief, VPs, sponsors and donors, youth. The event exceeded fundraising objectives, all proceeds going directly to students (scholarships and bursaries). Using undesignated donated funds for scholarships and bursaries, UNBC offered to match all donations made at the event up to \$12,500. To kick off the challenge, UNBC Executive Team made personal donations totaling \$2000. Over \$25,000 was raised at the breakfast plus the proceeds from the event itself for a total of \$50,000 (estimated). The success of the fundraiser was due in large part to the contribution of \$7500 from the 25th Anniversary fund allowing Athletics to bring such a high profile and sought after keynote speaker.
- c. The Dr. Bob Ewert Lecture will be held April 11th, planning by the Development Office along with the NMS, PG Community Foundation, Northern Health. 860 tickets sold so far close to a sell-out.
- d. UNBC is in receipt of an estate gift from a long time donor to UNBC (first in recent history) for a student award in the School of Education.
- e. A group of UNBC donors attended a private reception arranged with the Governor General of Canada, March 2nd prior to the public panel. Alex Castley, a UNBC grad who works with Integris Credit Union received the Governor General's Silver Medal while at UNBC and was able to have His Excellency sign it for him.
- f. R. van Adrichem attended the PG Community Foundation Fall Grant Reception on Dec 4. UNBC received a cheque for \$3,000.
- g. Through an introduction from Chancellor MacDonald, R. van Adrichem has been working with the Pacific Energy Innovation Association to advance opportunities for enhancing educational and demonstration capacity at UNBC related to rural and remote energy systems.

2. Communications with Stakeholders:

- a. R. van Adrichem met with Dave Porter of the BC First Nations Energy and Mining Council on Dec 5 in Prince George. This was followed by a campus tour in March.
- Dan Ryan, Todd Whitcombe and Bev Isaac (First Nations Centre) presented UNBC recruitment Wolfies to Lheidli T'enneh children, as per a request made by Chief Frederick
- Throughout the month of December R. van Adrichem met with various UNBC stakeholders and founders including Janine North, Don Bassermann, Charles Jago, and Bruce Strachan
- d. Campus tours were recently conducted with Richard Dunn of Encana, Lianne Olson and Keving Dobbin of Rio Tinto Alcan, and Shiela Flemmer of TransCanada

- e. During the CWG 480 grades 9 to 11 students from the region participated in the Canfor Tours organized as part of Canfor's CWG sponsorship. Students received a campus tour, a presentation from Dr. Chris Opio on opportunities in forestry and NRM programs. This was the first time many of these students had been on campus
- f. The CWG provided several networking opportunities for UNBC's senior administration including: pre and post closing ceremonies VIP receptions, sponsorship reception, City of PG reception, Lheidli T'enneh dinner and reception, and the Closing Ceremony on campus
- g. Just over 1500 UNBC alumni participated in the first-ever survey of UNBC graduates. Analaysis is now underway
- h. President Weeks hosted a dinner for Toronto alumni in February.
- i. Communications activities during negotiations and the recent job action was meant to inform multiple stakeholders about the status of negotiations.
 - A Communications Working Group was chaired by the Provost and included the Manager of Communications, the VP External Relations, the Dean of CSAM, and the Vice-Provost of Student Engagement.
 - A "faculty relations" website was created in April. It was the main repository for updates. See below for usage statistics:





- In late January, the Communications Working Group produced a communications workflow chart that identified the involvement of UNBC personnel and target audiences. See attached.
- Thirteen emails were sent directly to students. Emails were also sent directly to staff and faculty.
- The Vice-President External Relations has been UNBC's chief media spokesperson.
 As of writing, more than 40 interviews have been conducted. These have been with all local media outlets as well as with the Tyee, Global Television, and regional media. The UNBC strike generated roughly 450 media impressions in the first 13 days of the strike (this includes the same story running on multiple occasions radio newscasts, for example).

- i. New Advanced Education Minister Andrew Wilkinson visited UNBC in January and met with the senior administration team.
- The annual Premier's Natural Resources Forum took place in Prince George in late January, providing networking opportunities with provincial leaders
- iii. Local MLAs Shirley Bond and Mike Morris joined UNBC in celebrating the 10th anniversary of the Northern Medical Program on January 16
- iv. Planning had been completed for a lunch and research presentation for Government officials in Victoria. This was postponed due to the faculty job action.
- v. D. Weeks attended the announcement of Emily Carr University of Art & Design's intention to deliver programming in the Wood Innovation and Design Centre.
- vi. The Northern BC Career Zone Pavilion was officially opened by local MLAs at the CWG plaza on Feb 14. Several of UNBC's senior admin team attended
- vii. R. van Adrichem and K. Scouten attended the CWG provincial reception at WIDC on Feb 20, hosted by Shirley Bond.
- viii. Lieutenant Governor Judith Guichon toured WIDC and the UNBC campus on January 27. She met with a small group of students, alumni, local farmers, and faculty who are involved with northern food production

c. Federal Government

- i. R. van Adrichem met with MP Bob Zimmer in Ottawa on January 27 and discussed a meeting with the BC caucus.
- ii. R. van Adrichem attended the annual AUCC Government Relations meetings in Ottawa in late January

- iii. R. van Adrichem and Conservative party candidate Todd Doherty met on Feb 3
- iv. As part of the CWG, a breakfast meeting was held at UNBC for the provincial and territorial Sport Ministers on Feb 12

4. UNBC's 25th Anniversary

Governor General David Johnston visited UNBC on March 2 for a panel discussion at the PG Playhouse involving the GG, President Dan Weeks, and Mayor Lyn Hall. The discussion focused on the importance of cities and universities working together for their mutual benefit. More than 100 people attended.

Two students who have been hired to follow-up with personal phone calls to founders have completed more than 700 calls to date. This project is connected to the initiative to publicize the names of all 16,000 original petition-signers online and invite founders to update their contact information and tell the story of their involvement with UNBC. The purpose of the phone calls is to thank founders and bring them into a closer relationship with the University.

The Discovery Centre, presented during the Canada Games on the ground floor of the Library, was one of the largest 25th anniversary projects in terms of project budget. It featured displays and activities presented by over 30 students and faculty, and attracted over 1000 people during its two-week run.

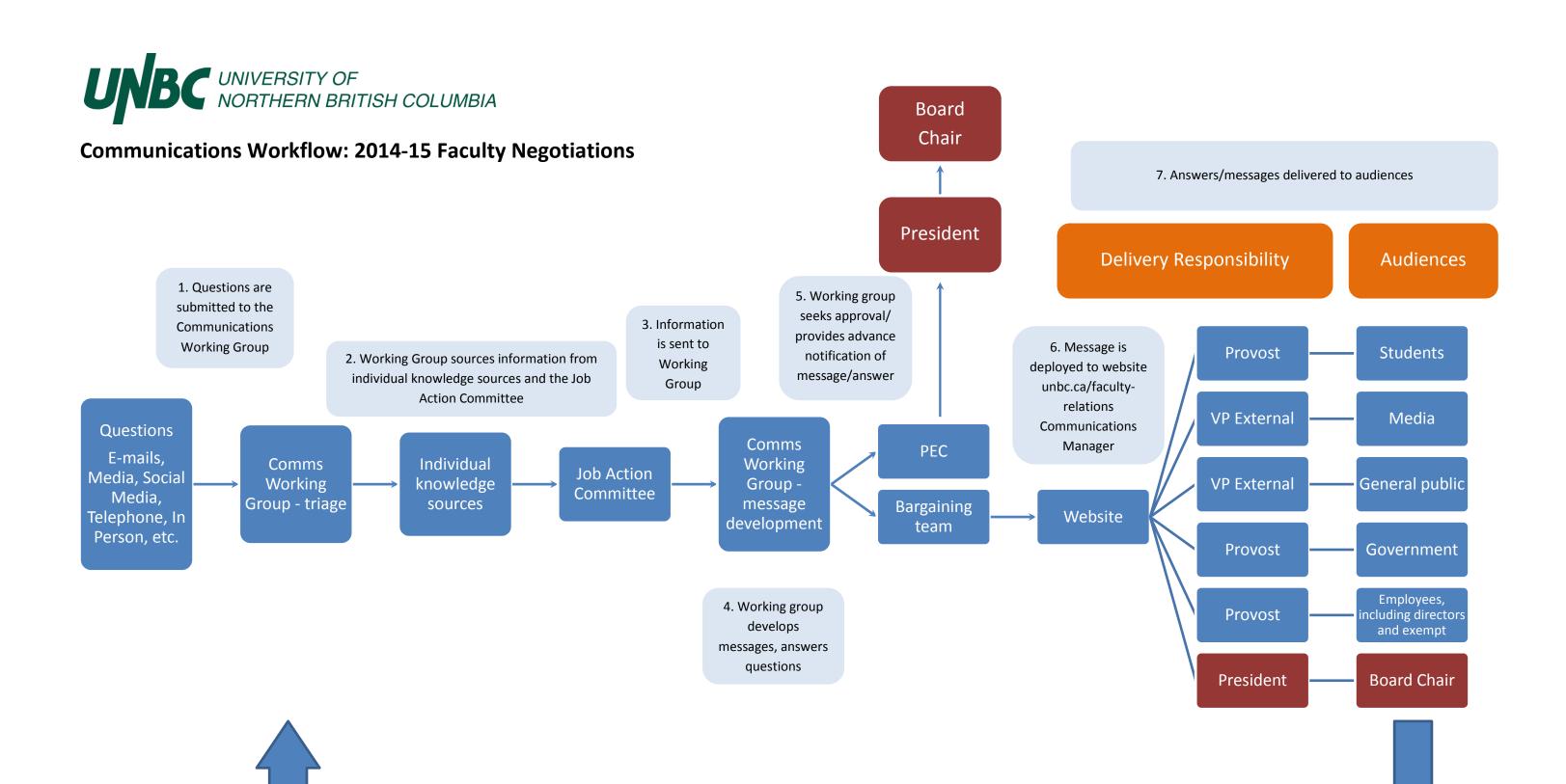
A Student Leadership Gala and Awards event on January 31st recognized over 65 students for their many contributions to UNBC. The event included workshops, presentations, dinner and a keynote by Drew Dudley, whose TED talk was voted as "one of the 15 most inspirational TED talks of all time."

A team including two UNBC faculty members and two local community artists has been selected to create a permanent art installation for the 25th Anniversary project led by the Northern BC Archives. Their concept includes two paintings linked together by pieces of fused glass, that tell a story of UNBC's past, future and the journey linking the two. The project will involve members of the Prince George and university communities in co-creating the art glass through a series of workshops.

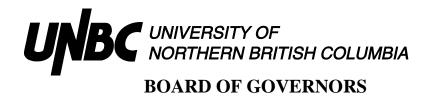

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VICE-PRESIDENT, RESEARCH BOARD REPORT – MARCH 2015

ACTIVITIES EXTERNAL TO UNBC DURING THE PAST THREE MONTHS

SSHRC Annual Meeting (December 3): This meeting is held each year to connect with SSHRC Leaders of each institution. The meeting is to discuss the future planning for research funding in Canada and to look at the current trends and practices. This is also a great networking opportunity.

RUCBC Meeting (January 21): This regular meeting which takes place either through a teleconference call or face to face was held in Vancouver. We discussed the strategy for Canada First Research Excellence Fund. We also met with the CEO of the BC Innovation Council, Michael Smith Health Research Foundation and discussed the future possibilities and opportunities. One of UNBC's researchers is participating in a Canada First Research Excellence Fund proposal submitted by the University of Victoria in the area of Climate Change and Coastal region.

Natural Resource Forum (January 20-23): UNBC's Office of Research has been a sponsor and participant in this annual conference each year. This conference is to connect with industries and discuss collaborations on a topic of mutual interests. The Office of Research prepared an information document for the industries to highlight the resources UNBC has to partner with the industries.

Michael Smith Foundation for Health Research (MSFHR, January 29): MSFHR held its annual reception to honor the recipients of MSFHR's Fellows. My participation was to show support and network.

Meeting with Rachael Ritchie, Genome BC (January 29): This meeting was arranged at my request to touch base with Genome BC. This organization funds research in various fields and promotes the understanding and use of genome based technology in research and innovation. UNBC has researchers who have applied for funding from Genome BC. A face to face meeting is always helpful in highlighting what we are doing and how Genome BC could enhance our research capacity in the north.

Meeting with Laurence Meadows, MITACS (January 29): Mitacs is a funding agency which promotes involvement of students with industries and not for profit organizations. It supports funding in all disciplines. The purpose of this meeting was to discuss how UNBC can take additional advantage of the opportunities offered by Mitacs program. UNBC is an Associate Member and the fee to join Mitacs is based on the number of graduate students we have. Our membership is approximately \$20,000. I also requested a report from Mitacs (see attached) to determine if this membership should be maintained. Whereas UNBC has benefitted by the Mitacs Accelerate Program, we should and could take additional advantage of this membership. The Office of Research will be enhancing its effort to let the research community know about this program and support submissions to Mitacs.

Meeting with the Western Economic Diversification Officials (January 29, 2015): This meeting was to address the expenditure and reporting of WED funding received by UNBC in 2010. This meeting was critical to ensure that UNBC is seen in a positive light with WED for future funding.

ACCRU Meeting (February 23): The Alliance of the Council of Comprehensive Research Universities are working together to enhance the profile of Canadian Universities who may not fall under the category of U15 (15 highly research intense universities in Canada). ACCRU is critical for positioning the small and medium size institutions to be heard at the Federal level.

SELECTED HIGHLIGHTS: RESEARCH FUNDING AND RECOGNITION

Dr. Mark Shrimpton received more than \$350,000 to establish a Fish Aquatic Laboratory and enhance genomic capabilities from the Canadian Foundation for Innovation and BC Advanced Knowledge Development Fund. Dr. Shrimpton is a Fish Biologist and through these funding sources he is building a much needed research capacity at UNBC.

Dr. Stephen Rader and his team of researchers have discovered a new way to study gene splicing in premessenger ribonucleic acid (RNA). The large number of diseases linked to splicing (ranging from cancer to cystic fibrosis to spinal muscular atrophy) indicates the importance of this process for proper cell function, but the complexity of the process has hampered our ability to investigate how splicing happens.

The team studied the splicing process in red alga (C. merolae) and discovered it is the first known organism to splice genes without the help of a specific type of small nuclear RNA called U1.

This important discovery could help provide a better understanding of how the process works in humans and lead to development of new treatments for genetic diseases.

"Dramatically Reduced Spliceosome in Cyanidioschyzon Merolae" was recently published in the prestigious journal Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences.

Dr. Chow Lee and his team have published recently in a highly acclaimed journal, the Journal of Biological Chemistry. The team has identified unique characteristics of a protein that is involved in the growth and progression of cancer cells. The significance of their research is two-fold; 1.) we have increased our knowledge of how a protein involved with cancer growth functions in the cell, and 2.) we have identified ideal targets for anti-cancer therapeutics. Their results can assist in the design of drugs that could be used to prevent the growth and spread of cancer cells. According to the lead author, Mark Barnes, "The better we understand how cancer works, the better chance we have at identifying ways to stop cancer."

Information on UNBC Social Sciences and Humanities (SSH) Seed Grant Awardees as requested by the Board

A few selected abstracts as submitted by the applicants follow:

Lantana Usman, Education

Terrorism and Girls Education in Northern Nigeria: Analysis of Educational Policy Reforms

The goal of my research is to investigate the school transition and adjustment of the girls in their new schools. I hope to elucidate school based reforms and resources as the UN Safe School Initiative for girls education in the affected research states, and particularly their impacts on the kidnapped girls. Secondary purpose of the research is to provide a report that will aid Nigerian institutions in charge of

girl-child education as the ministries of education to review current policy practices for a more inclusive and transformational school leadership and management of girls education in northern Nigeria.

Ben Bryce, History

Healing the Nation: Healthcare, Philanthorpy, and Ethnicity in Argentina, 1880-1945

The first project that this grant will support is a brief two-week archival trip to Buenos Aires in late April and early May in conjunction with a conference on immigration that I will attending at the Universidad Nacional de San Martín. After the conference, I will begin to lay the foundations for my next major research project, entitled "Healing the Nation: Healthcare, Philanthropy, and Ethnicity in Argentina, 1880-1945." In Buenos Aires, I will research at the archives of several foreign-language hospitals, the Argentine National Library, and the library of the Faculty of Medicine at the University of Buenos Aires. I will also make contact with the Museum of Immigration in Buenos Aires in order develop stronger connections with different community groups and lay the groundwork for a public lecture and a conference in 2016.

The second major research activity that this grant will support is a monograph entitled The

Boundaries of Ethnicity: Language, Community, and Religion in Canada, 1880-1930. Between May and August 2015, I will carry out extensive archival work in the Great Lakes region in order to complete the research for this book. It examines the conflicting views over issues of citizenship and ethnicity held by German-speaking immigrants, bilingual Canadians of German heritage, politicians, and religious leaders. It stresses the importance bilingualism and religious identities within the individual, group, and national constructions of ethnicity. I argue that the negotiation between state bureaucrats, community leaders, and bilingual children carved out a space for cultural pluralism in many Canadians' understanding of the nation in the early-twentieth century. The book engages with broader debates about state authority, nationalist ideologies, and language policy in North America.

Boris DeWiel, Political Science

Reality, Creativity, Discovery

The project is a monograph in philosophy, for which I request funding for final production assistance and for dissemination. The research question is whether reality is created or discovered. I take the latter position and argue that creativity, including human creativity, is a post-biblical notion that has been accepted uncritically by Western modernity. Humans have the limited power to discover realities but we do not literally have the power to bring new realities into existence. As a literalism, the notion of human creativity is a false inheritance.

Greg Halseth, Geography

Lessons from Smart Service Infrastructure Projects in Rural BC

This project will identify key benefits and lessons for developing smart, efficient service infrastructure that can enhance the capacity and resiliency of rural and small town places. Developing an understanding of these lessons is critically important as many organizations and communities respond to ongoing social, economic, and political restructuring with fewer human and financial resources.

Kristen Guest, English

Equine Cultures: The Horse and Human Society, 1700-present

Over the past decade Animal Studies has emerged as a vibrant focus of interdisciplinary research for scholars in the Humanities, Social Sciences, and Sciences. Attesting to the strength of this emergent field are the wide range of dedicated monograph series, journals, scholarly organizations, and graduate programs that have recently appeared. Within this field, the study of horses has become a significant focus, particularly among humanities scholars who have investigated how these non-human animals have shaped human culture in real and symbolic terms. As a species often identified with human capabilities (intelligence and emotional sensitivity, as well as abstract qualities such as nobility and honour) the horse offers a unique discursive framework for thinking about the formation of human identity, even as it asks us to consider fundamental differences between human and non-human forms of subjectivity. Thus far, most research focusing on horses and human society have focused on the early modern period (pre-1700). This project will examine the horse in modern society (1700 to the present), focusing on how economic and technological advances associated with modernity have impacted a range of equine cultures and their related human identities.

Executive Summary

Report Objectives

The goal of this report is to summarize and present findings from a recent longitudinal survey of current and past Mitacs-Accelerate industry partners. This carefully designed survey allows Mitacs to capture intermediate and long-term outcomes and impacts of its Accelerate internship program.

Mitacs is proud to share these exciting results with its external stakeholders, including our funders and current and future program participants, demonstrating the significant and tangible impact that Accelerate is having on Canadian companies and their achievements.

Key Results

Program Satisfaction:

- Over 95% of companies indicated that Accelerate was successful in meeting their corporate needs
- 92% of companies would recommend Accelerate to others and 88% would participate in the program again

Business and R&D Outcomes:

- 66% of companies indicated that the project results have been (32%) or will be (34%) commercialized
- 30% of companies have hired one or several interns(25% into new positions; 10% into existing positions)
- 26% of companies hired other new employees based on their Accelerate experience
- 40% of companies invested \$250,000 or more of new money into R&D as a result of their Accelerate experience (including 10% that invested more than \$500,000)

Industry-Academic Research Collaborations:

- 66% of companies remained in contact with their Accelerate intern(s) in some capacity
- 82% of companies continued to collaborate with the academic supervisor involved in the Accelerate project
- 47% of companies engaged in new collaborations within the academic sector

Conclusion

The majority of Mitacs industry partners are extremely satisfied with their experiences to date, and their participation in the program has led to actions that are consistent with increased business investments in R&D and innovation.

Mitacs-Accelerate improves key industry partner business and R&D outcomes and promotes industry-academic relationships and collaborations.

We expect that as Accelerate continues to grow, the clear impact it is having on R&D investment, innovation, and productivity in Canada will continue to increase as well.



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Introduction and Survey Objectives

Rationale & Survey Objectives

The goal of this report is to summarize and present findings from a recent longitudinal survey of current and past Mitacs-Accelerate industry partners. This carefully designed survey allows Mitacs to capture intermediate and longterm outcomes and impacts of its Accelerate internship program. These results supplement the rich data that is already collected through participant exit surveys and final reports that are limited to immediate program satisfaction, outputs, and short-term participant outcomes.

Mitacs is proud to share these exciting results with its external stakeholders, including our funders and current and future program participants, demonstrating the significant and tangible impact that Accelerate is having on Canadian companies and their achievements. These results will also be used internally to inform program improvements and identify new or changing client needs.

Methodology

Design

The survey instrument was designed by the Mitacs Policy Team and reviewed by representatives from multiple Mitacs departments. It was created, managed and distributed using FluidSurveys, an online tool with which program participants and Mitacs staff were familiar. Upon completion, the survey instrument was programmed online and underwent both internal and external pre-testing. Where applicable, recommendations were integrated into the survey. Once finalized, the survey instrument was translated into French to provide respondents the option of participating in either official language.

Distribution

The list of survey participants was created using multiple Accelerate program databases. All for-profit companies that participated in the Accelerate program for the first time between 2004 and 2013 were targeted. When Mitacs industry partners had participated in multiple Accelerate projects, each contact associated with one or more projects was contacted. A total of 1,421 part participants were reached representing 1,287 Mitacs industry partner organizations.

The survey was active between November 4 and November 27, 2014. Direct email invitations with an embedded survey link were sent on November 4. The original email invitation, and subsequent email reminders, were crafted in English and French, and outlined the goals of the survey as well as survey procedures. A first reminder targeting all participants who had not completed the survey was sent on November 20 and a final reminder was sent on November 26.

Response Rate

A total of 253 individuals responded to at least one question of the survey, including 214 complete questionnaires. This resulted in an overall response rate of 19% of all for-profit Mitacs industry partners. Table 1 provides a detailed breakdown of survey respondents.

Limitations

While unlikely to have significant impact on the results of this survey, the following limitations are noted:

- Email invitations were sent to the identified primary project contact at companies that participated in the Accelerate program. As a result, it is likely that a greater number of more recent participants were still in their positions and thus, we were likely not able to reach as many participants from longer ago.
- Between 2004 and 2013, Accelerate has evolved both in terms of program scope and implementation. However, this limitation is unlikely to have significant impacts on the results as the vast majority of survey respondents participated in the program between 2008 and 2013.
- Selection of an appropriate control group to whom Mitacs industry partners could be compared proved to be a significant challenge. Instead, we opted for an implicit study design, where respondents are asked to evaluate and comment on what impact the program had on their company. Where appropriate, national metrics pertaining to industry-university collaborations and relationships will be used.

Mitacs Industry Partner Demographics and Program Satisfaction

Industry Partner Demographics

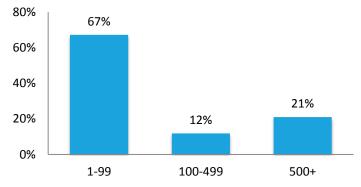


Figure 1: Mitacs industry partner size (number of employees)

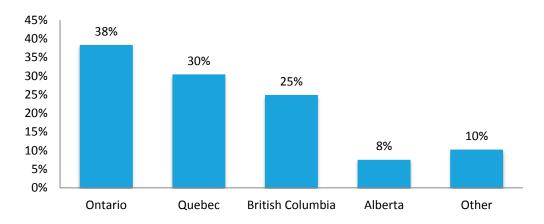


Figure 2: Province in which Accelerate project occurred (multiple responses permitted)

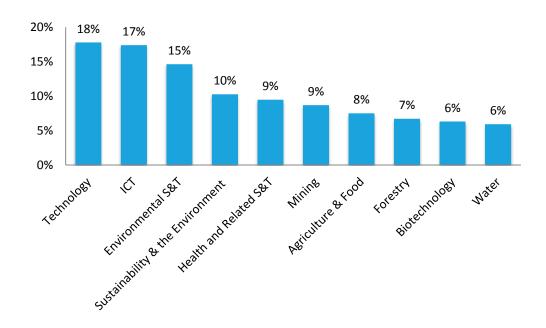


Figure 3: Industry sectors of survey respondents (top 10; multiple responses permitted)

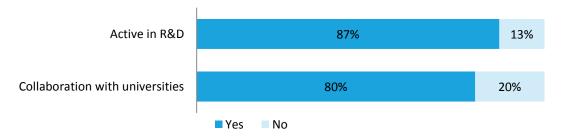


Figure 4: Proportion of Mitacs industry partners already involved in R&D and university collaborations

Survey respondents are a representative sample of Mitacs industry partners. They represent diverse companies with respect to size (figure 1), provincial distribution (figure 2), and industry sector (figure 3). Prior to their first experience with the Accelerate program, most industry partners were already active in R&D (87%) and most had previously collaborated with university researchers (81%; figure 4).

¹Reachable individuals are defined as survey participants for which the email invitation did not bounce back

Industry Partner Program Satisfaction

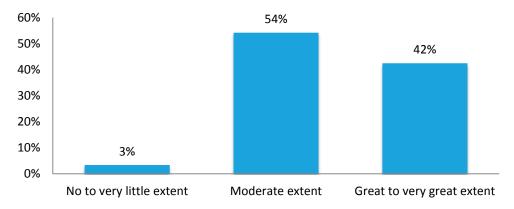


Figure 5: Extent to which Accelerate has helped Mitacs industry partner meet its corporate needs

Over 95% of survey respondents indicated that Accelerate was successful in meeting their corporate needs (to a moderate extent or more; figure 5).

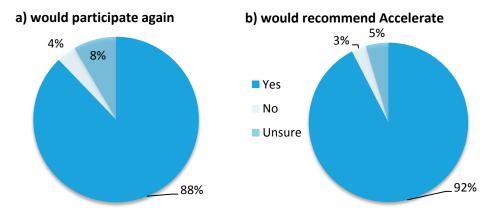


Figure 6: Survey respondent satisfaction with Accelerate program

In addition, the majority of Mitacs industry partners would participate in the program again (88%; figure 6a), or recommend Accelerate to other organizations (92%; figure 6b).

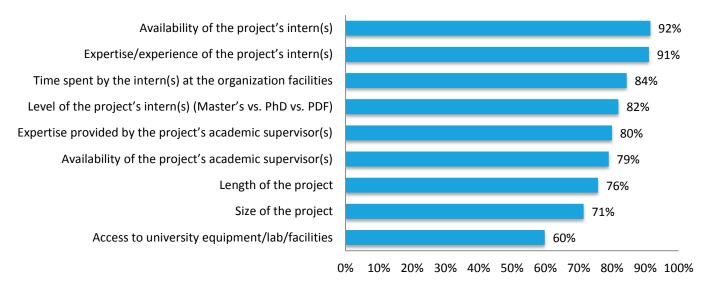


Figure 7: Mitacs program success factors selected by survey respondents (% of respondents who identified factor as moderately important or greater; multiple responses permitted)

Survey respondents identified several key factors that were important contributors to the success of their Mitacs experience. As shown in figure 7, survey respondents selected several success factors as being associated with the project(s) including: availability and expertise of the intern(s); time spent at the company facility; level of study of the intern(s); and expertise provided by the academic supervisor.

Mitacs improves key industry partner business outcomes

To better understand what made their experiences with Accelerate so successful, industry partners were asked a series of questions about specific business and R&D outcomes directly related to their participation in the Accelerate program. Given the time delay associated with the completion of a project and when some of the results will be fully realized or implemented, the data below may underestimate the actual outcomes in some cases.

Business Outcomes

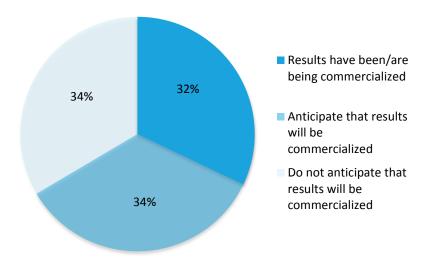


Figure 8: Proportion of survey respondents that have or intend to commercialize results from their Accelerate project(s)

First, survey respondents were asked about the commercialization potential of results from Accelerate project(s). Figure 8 shows that two thirds of Mitacs industry partners indicated that the results have been (32%), or will be (34%), commercialized.

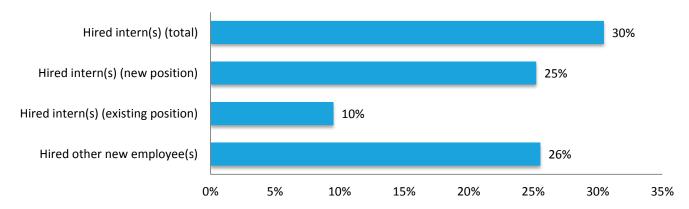


Figure 9: Proportion of Mitacs industry partners that hired new employees as a result of their Accelerate experience

Second, survey respondents indicated that their participation in the Accelerate program directly led to the creation of new jobs. As shown in figure 9, a total of 30% of industry partners have hired *at least one* of their interns (25% into newly created positions and 10% into existing positions). In addition, participation in the Accelerate program led to the hiring of other new employees for more than a quarter of partner organizations.

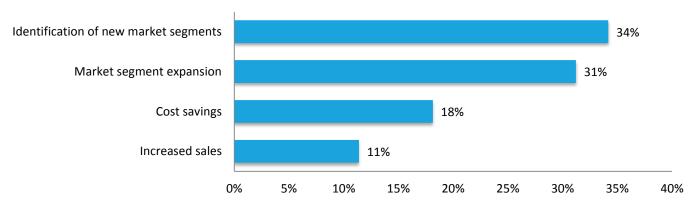


Figure 10: Additional positive business outcomes identified by survey respondents (multiple responses permitted)

Finally, in addition to commercialization and job creation, survey respondents identified several other important business outcomes resulting from their Accelerate experience (figure 10). The most commonly mentioned business outcomes included: identification of new (34%) or expanded (31%) market segments, cost savings (18%), and increased sales (11%).

R&D Outcomes

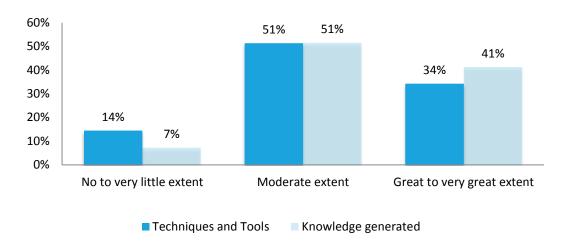


Figure 11: Extent to which Mitacs industry partner has used or is using R&D results from their Accelerate project(s)

Figure 11 highlights that the vast majority of respondents have used, or are still using, the R&D results from their Accelerate project(s). These results include: techniques (processes and methodologies) and tools (algorithms, software, machinery, etc.) or newly generated knowledge.

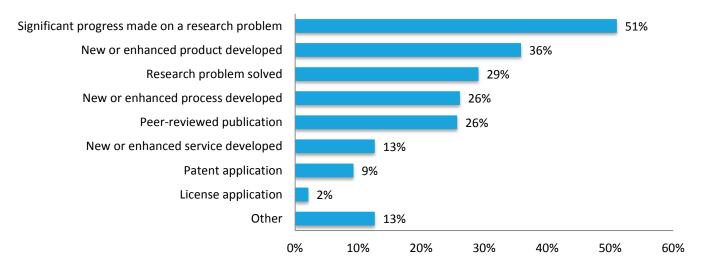


Figure 12: Most frequently identified R&D outcomes by Mitacs industry partners (multiple responses permitted)

Survey respondents were also asked about *specific* R&D-related outcomes that resulted from their Accelerate project(s). As shown in figure 12, the most cited outcome was significant progress made on a research problem (51%). Importantly, more than a third of respondents indicated that a new or enhanced product was developed as a result of the Accelerate project. Other R&D outcomes included: development of a new or enhanced process; a peer-reviewed publication; development of a new or enhanced service; patent or license application (figure 12).

In addition to understanding and identifying the outcomes of Accelerate program participation, we were also interested in knowing whether program participation had other longer term impacts on Mitacs industry partners. For example,



survey respondents were asked if new practices or behaviours could be identified within their organization as a result of their Accelerate experience.

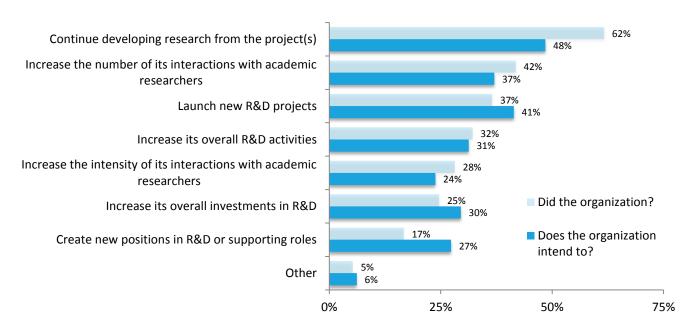


Figure 13: R&D-related changes resulting from Accelerate participation (multiple responses permitted)

Figure 13 details the R&D-related actions that resulted from Accelerate program participation including increasing overall investment in R&D activities, increasing the number and intensity of interactions with academic researchers, continuing existing or launching new R&D projects, and creating new positions in R&D or supporting roles.

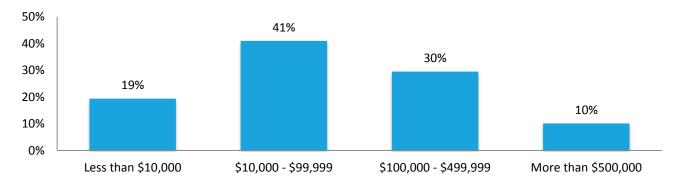


Figure 14: Value of new R&D investments by Mitacs industry partners as a result of Accelerate experience

Finally, survey respondents were asked about new R&D investments made at their company as a result of their Accelerate program participation. Figure 14 shows that participation in Accelerate led to significant new investments by industry partners. Ten percent of survey respondents indicated that they invested more than \$500,000 as a result of their participation in the program, while 30% invested between \$250,000 and \$500,000, and 41% invested between \$10,000 and \$250,000.

Mitacs promotes industry-academic relationships and collaborations

While business-related successes are important outcomes of industry participation in Mitacs' Accelerate program, we also wanted to identify what impact participation had on industry partner research collaborations and relationships with academic researchers.

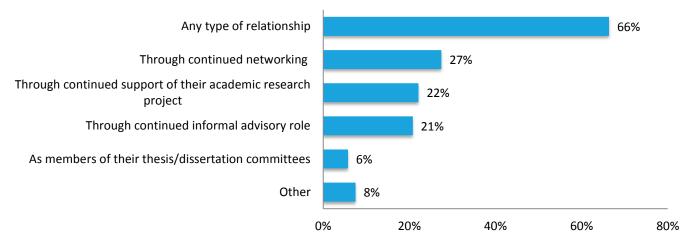


Figure 15: Proportion of Mitacs industry partners that maintained a relationship with at least one of their Accelerate interns following the project's completion (multiple responses permitted)

As shown in figure 15, two thirds of survey respondents remained in contact with their Accelerate intern(s) in some capacity (including through hiring the intern; see figure 9). When asked about the nature of the relationship with their intern, responses included through continued networking, continuing to support their academic research project, continuing to act as an advisor, or participation as a member of the intern's thesis committee (figure 15).

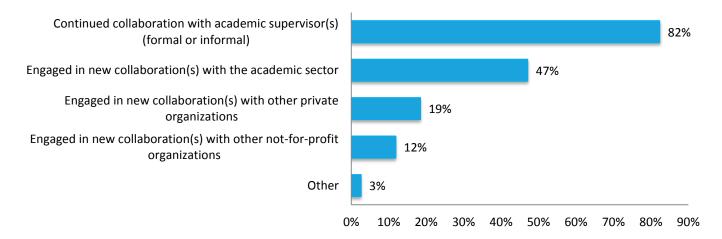


Figure 16: Academic collaborations resulting from Accelerate participation by Mitacs partner organizations (multiple responses permitted)

The majority of survey respondents also indicated that their companies remained in contact with the academic supervisor(s) associated to the Accelerate research project, either formally or informally (figure 16). Of note, nearly half of survey respondents engaged in *new* collaborations within the academic sector as a result of their participation in the Accelerate program.

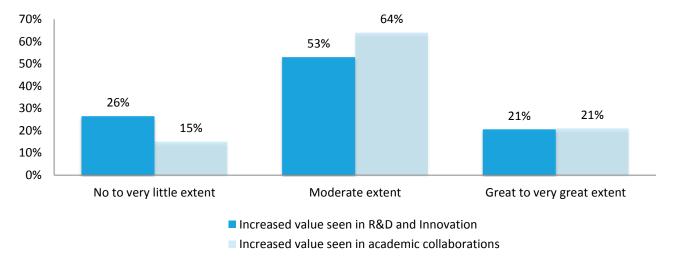


Figure 17: Increased value seen in R&D & innovation and academic collaboration as a result of Accelerate participation

Finally, while most Mitacs industry partners were already active in R&D and collaborating with the academic sector prior to their first Accelerate project, figure 17 shows that for the vast majority of companies, participation in Accelerate led to at least a moderate increase in the value seen in R&D or in collaborating with the academic sector.

Conclusion

The results of this survey indicate that Mitacs-Accelerate improves key industry partner business and R&D outcomes and promotes industry-academic relationships and collaborations. Overall, the majority of Mitacs industry partners are extremely satisfied with their experiences to date and their participation in the program has led to actions that are consistent with increased business investments in R&D and innovation.

We expect that as Accelerate continues to grow, the clear impact it is having on business R&D investment, innovation, and productivity in Canada will continue to expand as well.
