




5. What language is your current program of study?











14. Are you the first in your immediate family (siblings, parents and grandparents) to attend post-secondary education?







How satisfied were you with the institutional support your spouse received to settle and integrate into the community?























49. Do you plan to apply for a post-graduate work permit?





50. Do you plan to apply for Permanent Resident Status in Canada?








