

About Northern FIRE

Northern FIRE (Feminist Institute for Research and Evaluation) aims to:

- Achieve greater equality for women living in northern, rural, and remote communities,
- Raise awareness about these women's experiences with the health care systems,
- Create a women-centered approach to examine determinants of health,
- Facilitate meaningful research that addresses northern women's health issues together,
- Engage and mentor students and community-based researchers,
- Disseminate information, resources, and knowledge, and
- Collaborate with community agencies and women from the north of related projects.

The Canadian health sector has often overlooked the unique needs of northern communities, forcing residents of the north to take additional steps and/or incur additional costs to receive the same level of health care as those who live in southern Canada (Young, Ng, & Chatwood, 2015).



Multiple studies and reports by researchers and government agencies demonstrate that Canadians living in rural and remote communities of northern Canada merit additional attention to their health needs due to their unique geography, histories, and demographics (e.g., the large proportion of Indigenous peoples in the northern population).

Women from northern communities face higher rates of violence in addition to having less access to health resources, services, and treatments. These poor health indicators put northern women in a vulnerable position, especially when factors such as geography, climate, and issues related to age, culture, race, sexual orientation, and

socioeconomic status are considered.

From illness, to disease, to conditions caused by the environment or social interaction, deeper examination of health at a social level is essential to understanding an individual's health. Therefore, it is valuable to recognize the compounding influences that gender and geography can have on an individual's wellbeing, as this allows for a greater understanding of northern women's experiences and their struggles with all areas of health-related issues.

Northern FIRE is passionate about gaining a deeper understanding of northern women's health experiences and working with community agencies and individual women to improve the health care system and social development in the north.



Health, Gender & Context: The Northern Health Regions

Current literature demonstrates that the Canadian health sector continues to overlook the unique needs of northern, rural, and remote communities, therefore forcing residents of these communities to take additional steps and/or incur additional costs to receive the same level of health care as those who live in southern Canada. Women living in northern, rural, or remote communities are in a more vulnerable position regarding health status and health care because their geographical position intensifies and compounds social determinants. For example, the resource-based communities often found in the north have unstable, fluctuating economies and less access to higher education opportunities. Regions within the Northern Health Authority are particularly susceptible to such issues.

The Northern Health Authority covers a vast area of the province (see image below). The delivery of health services faces numerous challenges, particularly in remote communities. For instance, the communities of Tsay Keh Dene and Kwadacha, north of Williston reservoir, are accessible only by plane when the gravel runway is in good condition (either frozen or dry). Additionally, northern British Columbia is home to several towns that once relied on the mining industry to provide local services, with many now relying on oil and gas. Many of these communities must continuously fight to maintain a health care infrastructure for residents. These are just some examples of the additional barriers that affect health care, health access and health status in the north.

What Is Violence Against Women?

Violence against women is about the control and coercion of women.

Violence against women in relationships (VAWIR) is a power- (and oftentimes) gender-based crime, usually by one partner, directed at a female partner.

At the centre of violent relationships is a pattern of power and control. Individual events may not appear violent or abusive, but added up and experienced over time, they result in one person in a relationship holding the power and having a lot of control over the other.

Incidents at first may not seem serious, but usually escalate over time, leading women to feel degraded, isolated, and with little control over their lives.

You Are Not Alone

- 50% of women in Canada have experienced sexual or physical violence in their lifetimes.
- Each year, 20,000 women in B.C. experience relationship violence.

Signs of Domestic Violence

If you are in immediate danger or fear for your safety call 911 as soon as possible.

Most relationships have difficult times, and almost every couple argues now and then. But violence is different from common marital or relationship problems.

Domestic violence is a pattern of abuse that a partner—former or current partner, spouse, or boyfriend or girlfriend—uses to control the behaviour of another.

Domestic violence often starts with threats, name-calling, and slamming doors or breaking dishes, and it can build up to pushing, slapping, and other violent acts. If you are concerned about your relationship, ask yourself the following questions.

Does your Partner:

- Embarrass you with put-downs?
- Look at you or act in ways that scare you?
- Control what you do, who you see or talk to, or where you go?
- Stop you from seeing your friends or family members?
- Take your money or paycheque, make you ask for money, or refuse to give you money?
- Make all the decisions?
- Tell you that you're a bad parent or threaten to take away or hurt your children?
- Threaten to kill himself or herself?
- Prevent you from working or going to school?
- Act like the abuse is no big deal or is your fault, or even deny doing it?
- Destroy your property?
- Harm, threaten, or threaten to kill your pets?
- Intimidate you with guns, knives, or other weapons?
- Shove you, slap you, choke you, or hit you?
- Threaten to kill you?

If *any* of these things or <u>other types of abuse</u> are happening, you need to seek help. It's important to know that you are not alone. The way your partner acts is not your fault. Help is available.

Developing a Safety Plan

A violent relationship puts you and your children at risk for injury and even death. Developing a plan will help provide for your safety and the safety of your children.

Your first step is to contact a local advocacy group for support, information, and advice on how to stay safe. Please find your local community section of this manual for resources on getting help in your area.

Stay safe if you are in a violent relationship.

- When an argument occurs, go to a safe place.
- Try to have a phone available at all times.
- Create a code word or sign that can be used to alert family and friends that you need help.

Have a <u>safety plan if you're preparing to leave</u> a violent relationship.

- Have a packed bag ready with copies of your car and house keys, money or credit cards, and important papers, such as Social Insurance Number (SIN) cards and birth certificates for you and your children. Keep it hidden in your home or even better, leave the bag with friends or family or at work if possible.
- Open a savings account or get a credit card if you can do so in secret.
- Use this checklist of items to take with you when you leave.

Learn how to stay safe after you leave a violent relationship.

- Change your phone number.
- Change your routine.
- If your abuser comes to your home, you don't have to let him or her in. Keep the doors closed and locked and call the police.

After you have left, you may need to take extra measures to stay safe. Your local advocacy group can help you get in touch with legal and social services in your area. This group may also provide information on counselling and support groups that can help you recover emotionally from your abuse.

Developing a Safety Plan

If you are considering leaving, even just for a short time (for example, going to a Transition House or a relative's house), there are **some important items for you to take with you**. Collect these items or make copies ahead of time and keep them in a safe place in case you need to leave urgently:

- Driver's licence, social insurance card (SIN), birth certificates (yours and your children's)
- Care Card, medications, medical records (yours and your children's)
- Marriage licence, custody and access papers, divorce papers, protection orders, peace bonds or restraining orders
- Passport, permanent residence status card, immigration, or refugee papers
- Money, chequebook, debit and/or credit cards, bank book or bank statement
- Lease, rental agreement, house deed
- House keys, car keys
- Cell phone, address book

How to Get a Protective Order

If you are in immediate danger or fear for your safety call 911 as soon as possible.

Protective orders may also be called restraining orders, emergency intervention orders, peace bonds, or emergency protective orders.

- Call your local advocacy group, a law office, or tell the police you want to get one. You may be able to get an emergency protective order immediately.
- For a temporary protective order, you will probably have to see a family court judge. Tell the judge about times you have been threatened with violence or have suffered abuse. List any witnesses, including police officers, who may help your case.
- Show the judge any evidence of physical abuse, such as photos of bruises, injuries, or damaged property.
- Tell the judge about any prior arrests the abuser has had or obtain the arrest reports. You may be able to get these from the police department or sheriff's office in the community where past abuse occurred.

To be eligible for a protective order, you and the other party must fit into at least *one* of the following categories:

- Married, or formerly married
- Related by blood, marriage, or adoption
- Currently living together or must have formerly lived together
- Currently or formerly in a dating relationship
- The parents in common of minor children

For a protective order to work effectively, you must:

- Inform the court of your specific safety needs, including when you are at work, those of your children, and any other particular circumstances.
- Request custody and visitation restrictions or "no contact" orders to ensure your children's safety.
- Call the police every time the order is violated.

If you travel to another province, check to see whether your protective order is valid in that province. Protective orders are valid across some province lines. Protective orders remain in effect until they are removed by the court, even if the victim consents to contact with the abuser.

VictimLinkBC

VictimLinkBC is a toll-free, confidential, multilingual telephone service available across BC and the Yukon 24 hours a day, 7 days a week by calling 1-800-563-0808 or sending an email to VictimLinkBC@bc211.ca. It provides information and referral services to all victims of crime and immediate crisis support to victims of family and sexual violence, including victims of human trafficking exploited for labour or sexual services.

VictimLinkBC provides service in more than 150 languages, including many North American Aboriginal languages. In 2019-2020, VictimLinkBC assisted on more than 12,000 calls.

Victim service workers can provide information and referrals to all victims of crime and crisis support to victims. Even if you're not sure if you have been a victim of crime, you can call VictimLinkBC at 1-800-563-0808 or email <u>VictimLinkBC@bc211.ca</u> for assistance. Your call will be completely confidential.

All VictimLinkBC staff are trained victim service workers and can connect people to a network of community, social, health, justice and government resources, including victim services, transition houses and counselling resources. They also provide information on the justice system, relevant federal and provincial legislation and programs, crime prevention, safety planning, protection order registry and other resources as needed.

Any time of the day or night, every day of the year, VictimLinkBC is as close as your phone or the Internet and can provide you confidential support and information you can trust.

Definitions

- **Community-based victim service programs** provide services primarily to victims of family and sexual violence.
- Police-Based Victim Service programs provide services to victims of all crimes.
- Stopping the Violence Counselling programs provide individual and/or group counselling
 for women who have experienced childhood abuse, sexual assault, and/or violence in their
 relationships.
- PEACE (Prevention, Education, Advocacy, Counselling and Empowerment) programs (formerly Children Who Witness Abuse programs) provide group and individual counselling for children ages 3 18 who have witnessed abuse, threats, or violence in the home.
- **Outreach Services programs** provide women with supportive counselling, information and referrals, and accompaniment and transportation to other services.
- **Multicultural Outreach Services programs** assist immigrant and visible minority women in their own languages.
- **Court Support Programs** provide information and support to victims of all types of crime involved in criminal court processes.
