

Second Annual Polar Day at UNBC



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On February 8th and 9th, the Northern Studies Program will be hosting the Second Annual UNBC Polar Day. This year's keynote presenter is internationally-renowned anthropologist and Arctic researcher, **Dr. Hugh Brody (Canada Research Chair in Aboriginal Studies at the University of the Fraser Valley)**. Dr. Brody will be presenting on "Indigenous Land Use in the Canadian Arctic" from 1:00-3:00 in the Weldwood Theatre (7-238) on Thursday February 9th.

Polar Day will also feature **award-winning documentary film maker and environmental activist, Mark Terry**. He will be showing his latest film, *The Polar Explorer*, on Wednesday February 9th from 7:00-9:00 in room 7-212. Admission is free. This film, made in partnership with the United Nations Programme, was the only one officially invited by the UN to be screened to delegates and world leaders attending COP16, the Climate Change Conference in Cancun last December.



The film reports on the latest scientific discoveries related to climate change in the Arctic and the Antarctic. Mark will also be holding a **film-making workshop** on Wednesday February 9th from 2:00-4:00 in room 5-176. Everyone is welcome. The Northern Research Group will be hosting a **Polar Expo** in the Wintergarden on Thursday February 9. The Expo will feature current research on the Arctic and Antarctic, as well as a **Polar Café** where students, faculty, staff and community members will have an opportunity to meet with our Polar Day guests, Hugh Brody and Mark Terry.
