It is also my pleasure to give a short retrospective in this newsletter. Firstly, I want to acknowledge the traditional territories of the Ts'msyen Nation, where I live. I also want to thank UNBC, my colleagues, students, elders, friends, and my family for contributing to the last ten amazing years. I am continually awe-struck by the beauty and spirit of the Northwest.

My introduction to the Northwest began in May 2003, when I flew into Terrace with a colleague to conduct workshops in the Nass Valley. From my seat on the plane, my heart raced as I peered over the vast terrain of mountains and pristine glacial outflows. Little did I know then, that I would replay this moment many times over.

When my colleague and I landed in Terrace, I felt an overwhelming sense of awe even before I reached the terminal. The remaining 100 km-trip to Gitlaxt'aamiks was unforgettable with breath-taking landscapes and mountain views. Upon our return, a beloved elder from the Nass hitched a ride with us into town. As we drove, she cracked hilarious jokes and intermingled stories of the land. She also began encouraging me to move to Terrace and even jokingly pointed out old and abandoned places I could fix-up. As we laughed and teased each other, the seed of relocating started to take root. It took another workshop in Gitlaxt'aamiks and a 2 ½ -year search for a home when we arrived in Terrace in August 2006. It was a daunting time for our family, having no contacts in Terrace and little more than a call in our hearts to guide us.

As of this year, I will be concentrating on initiatives within the School of Education.

Although there have been many changes at UNBC since I have arrived, the guiding principle remains the same, "a Northern university for the people in the North". UNBC, with its campuses situated on many traditional territories, is always in my awareness and is a priority for me. I share the belief that improved educational outcomes for aboriginal students will be a pivotal driving force for Canadian society. As Canada enters its 150th year, I can only hope that all Canadians are reminded of the sacrifices made by the generations that came before us, to continue to shape a more inclusive and fair society as we progress forward.

With the introduction of *BC's new school curriculum*, it is opening new pathways of student engagement and encouraging leadership at a younger age. This is a very exciting time for educators.
