NRESi's PROJECT COMMEMORATING UNBC's 25th ANNIVERSARY

A Living Memorial and Future Legacy

Project 1: Ceremonial Tree Planting


With the planting of five, 5-year old trees on the UNBC Prince George campus, NRESi will be helping to kick-off UNBC's 25th anniversary year. This will take place on Orientation Day, which will be on September 2nd, 2014, starting at 12:45pm. NRESi's Planning Committee has been working with UNBC Facilities, the David Douglas Botanical Society, and other partners to assist in identifying appropriate location options for the trees. We are also exploring ideas to incorporate different recognitions as part of the initiative, such as involving representatives to be honorary planters (e.g. a first year student, an alumni, founding faculty, a petition signer, founders). A plaque is under development that will recognize the milestone and describe how these trees also represent the larger tree planting initiative (see project 2). This will be an open event and we welcome the full NRESi and NRES community and our networks to join us in this event and the anniversary kickoff.

Project 2: Tree Planting Legacy Project

To recognize the 16,000 petition signers who showed the initial support from the community of a university in northern British Columbia, NRESi will be planting 16,000 trees in honour of each of their important contributions. The intent is to plant trees at all of the UNBC campuses/communities, Research Forests, and the Research Centre. NRESi's Planning Committee is working with representatives across all of the properties to identify how many trees they would like to plant, what species, and what age will be preferred. In some cases, our contacts have engaged partners or are exploring opportunities in community parks, in situations where UNBC does not own property. We have had great interest from the Research Forests, who are willing and able to plant the majority of the trees on their lands. Each location will have a plaque describing the initiative and we are also looking into registering this project for carbon sequestration purposes.

Project 3: Anniversary Panel Discussion

As part of NRESi weekly colloquium series, we will be hosting a special anniversary panel discussion and celebration. This has been scheduled for Friday, September 19th, 2014. We will be inviting a range of individuals with the history, experience, and foresight to reflect on the accomplishments of NRESi and NRES, while also looking to the future and the opportunities possible for the Institute and its members. There will also be time for discussion, where we can engage in a dialogue on these themes together. We welcome any thoughts you may have on topics and/or representatives we should consider as part of this panel.
