environmentally focused research and as an identifiable unit to which communities, industry, and government can turn for help with research questions and assessments of research needs.

PLANS FOR 2008-2009

In July 2008, the NRES Institute intends to move to a single Director model, consistent with the long-term goals of the Institute. The Institute hopes to play coordination role to facilitate UNBC-based research as part of the Pacific Institute for Climate Solutions as well as the Future Forest Ecosystems Scientific Council. Institute members are planning an Occasional Paper exploring issues surrounding biomass energy conversion. We will continue to sponsor the Colloquium Series, an NRES Graduate Student Icebreaker, as well as the Annual Research Forum and Annual Lecture Series.

Financial Statement

Total revenues for FY 2007-2008 (\$11,470.98) from overhead redirection from the Vice-Provost for Research and Graduate Studies and matching overhead redirection from the associated administrative programs (ESM: Aukema, Booth, Burton, Egger, Gillingham, Green, Huber, Johnson, Lewis, Lindgren, Parker, Rea). Total expenditures (\$7,256.00) included stipends to the codirectors, sponsorship of the NRES Institute Colloquium, and office costs. The Doug-Little/Canfor Endowment supported the NRES Graduate Student Fall Icebreaker, the NRESI Research Forum and the NRESI Annual Lecture. Our year-end balance was \$51,292.98, a net increase in our year-end balance of \$4,214.98 from FY 2006-2007.



Our Purpose

The Natural Resources and Environmental Studies (NRES) Institute is a formal association of UNBC faculty and affiliates promoting integrative research to address natural resource systems and human uses of the environment, especially issues pertinent to northern regions. The primary goal is to integrate across perspectives to better understand the functions, viability, and values of natural resource systems.

Founded on and governed by the strengths of its members, the NRES Institute creates opportunities for collaboration among its members to work on complex problems and to disseminate results. It advocates both fundamental and applied research approaches to resource use that conserve ecosystem health, and sustain resourcedependent communities. The NRES Institute serves to create alliances among researchers, resource managers, and representatives of all levels of governance and industry, communities, and First Nations, which are necessary to integrate research into management, and to keep research relevant and applicable to problems that require innovative solutions.

What We Do

The NRES Institute fosters communication among researchers and potential partners, rather than sponsoring or conducting specific research projects. It provides a conduit for basic and applied research opportunities from outside of the university, as well as a means to synthesize research

findings for dissemination beyond academia. As well, we create a bridge to the NRES Graduate Programs by providing graduate students with opportunities to interact with researchers and to showcase their own research activities.

2007-2008 Highlights

- There are currently 63 members of NRES Institute.
- The Institute sponsored 22 colloquia as part of the weekly NRES Institute Colloquium Series (past abstracts available at www.unbc.ca/nres).
- The NRES Institute Endowment was created (thanks to an initial contribution from Dr. Art Fredeen) to provide a mechanism for external support of the Institute. Individuals interested in contributing to this endowment should contact the UNBC Advancement Office.
- The 3rd Annual NRES Graduate Fall Research Social was held on September 14th to showcase the work of NRES Graduate Students and to welcome to graduate students to the program.
