**Tim** presented a poster "Geographic variation in mountain pine beetle productivity in British Columbia during an outbreak" co-authored by his supervisor **Staffan Lindgren.** 

**Brian** presented a paper "Spatiotemporal dynamics of the current mountain pine beetle outbreak in British Columbia: A link between patterns of land tenure and insect spread?" coauthored with **A. Carroll**, J. Zhu, K. Raffa, T. Sickley, and S. Taylor, and coauthored "Multiplecomponent symbioses facilitate invasion of variable habitats: Host colonization by spruce beetle-microbe associations as a model" with K. Raffa and Y. Cardoza.

**Dezene** was an organizer and moderator of a session entitled "Hurdling over obstacles toward implementation of semiochemical-based forest pest management tools" and sat as a panelist in another session called "Connecting the Scales: From Molecular through Landscape."

Dezene Huber attended the Third Workshop on Genetics of Bark Beetles and Associated Microorganisms (IUFRO WP 7.03.05 - Integrated Control of Scolytid Bark Beetles) in Asheville, NC, 20 - 21 May, 2006.
