2004 Convocation

Normally, one graduation ceremony per year is a big enough event. This year, however, UNBC will be hosting two official Convocation ceremonies and four other graduation celebrations. The main Convocation ceremony, as usual, will take place on **May 28**, when upwards of 700 students will don caps and gowns. Right after the Prince George event, regional graduation ceremonies will be held in the Nass Valley, Terrace, Quesnel, and Fort St John, between May 30th and June 3rd.

The second Convocation – on **August 17th** – will be a special event to recognize the tenth anniversary of the opening of the Prince George campus. Ten founders will receive honorary degrees, including former political, community, and education leaders. The event won't just be about reminiscing, however. That afternoon will see the official opening of the Northern Medical Program and the Northern Health Sciences Centre, with many of the first students and northern community leaders all playing an active role.
