#### **WEATHER AT A GLANCE**

 Currently under construction, the weather display on the second floor of the Teaching Lab will give you a sky watcher's view of what's happening outside. The display features realtime weather data from the UNBC weather station (located on the roof of the Research Lab), current animations showing satellite images, weather maps, local radar, and the Prince George weather forecasts. Additionally, a changing array of other weather and climate resources and equipment will be highlighted. In addition to providing public knowledge, this information is used by students in ENSC 201 and ENSC 408 for various assignments.
