Tree Improvement Station was called to update the Chief Forester and others on research opportunities and seed orchard management issues.

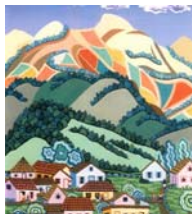
### TRAVEL
