Science for Communities: Mountain Pine Beetle Research Workshops November 7 (UBC) 9 & 10 (UNBC) The University of Northern British Columbia and the University of British Columbia are co-hosting two workshops on the mountain pine beetle research. These events will bring available science to bear on current mountain pine beetle management issues, identify research needs and gaps, and involve affected communities more directly in research planning.

The workshops will focus on providing a research synthesis of existing research in ecology, management, operations, regeneration, current and new product opportunities and socio-economic issues as well as asking participants to actively engage in creating recommendations for a future research agenda.
