At UNBC, safety is a shared responsibility. Whether you're on campus in Prince George, Terrace, Quesnel, or any of our satellite locations, being prepared for emergencies is essential to protect our community. This month, we're focusing on Emergency Preparedness and Response—what it means, why it matters, and how you can take action.

Let's explore how we can stay ready, resilient, and informed together.

Emergency preparedness is a foundational component of institutional resilience and public safety. It represents a proactive, systematic approach to anticipating, mitigating, and responding to crises that may threaten human life, infrastructure, operations, and the environment. At UNBC, this commitment is embedded in our core values and operational priorities.

UNBC is dedicated to ensuring the safety and well-being of all emergency responders and stakeholders by:

- Preserving life and minimizing human suffering through timely, coordinated response efforts. In emergencies, seconds matter.
 A well-prepared response plan (ERP) ensures rapid evacuation or shelter-in-place procedures, and access to first aid and emergency medical care.
- Safeguarding public health by controlling hazards and preventing secondary impacts.
- Protecting the University's infrastructure and physical assets, ensuring continuity of academic, research, and administrative functions.
- · Restoring institutional operations efficiently to minimize disruption to learning and community services.
- · Preserving environmental integrity, recognizing the ecological responsibilities tied to our campus and surrounding communities.
- · Reducing economic and social losses, both immediate and long-term, through strategic planning and resource allocation.

This comprehensive approach not only fulfills legal and ethical obligations but also reinforces UNBC's role as a responsible, resilient institution capable of withstanding and recovering from emergencies with minimal impact.

material spills, or extreme weather
events. Being prepared means:

- · Reducing risk and harm
- Responding quickly and effectively
- Supporting recovery and resilience

Preparedness isn't just about having a plan—it's about practicing it, knowing your role, and staying informed.

Risk Mitigation and Hazard Control

 Preparedness allows organizations and individuals to identify potential hazards (e.g., chemical spills, fires, natural disasters, pandemics) and implement controls to reduce their likelihood or impact. This aligns with the hierarchy of controls in occupational health and safety—eliminating or minimizing risks before they result in harm.

Safety Inspections & Emergency Readiness (Fire drills and First Aid drills)

Worksite safety inspections are a cornerstone of our proactive risk management strategy.
These inspections help identify gaps in emergency procedures, equipment readiness, and
hazard controls. Findings are reviewed by the Joint Occupational Health and Safety
Committee (JOHSC) to improve safety programs and ensure compliance with WorkSafeBC

Key Preparedness Actions

Here are some steps you can take today:

- Know your building's evacuation routes and muster points. This reduces anxiety and panic during crises.
- Download the UNBC Safe App for real-time alerts.
- Review UNBC's Emergency Response Procedures <u>Emergency Operations | UNBC</u> for events like:
 - Fire Evacuation <u>Fire evacuation | UNBC</u>
 - Earthquake Earthquake UNBC
 - Campus Closure / Snow or Extreme Weather

Preparedness is built through practice

Annually, during the start of the fall semester in September there are campus wide fire drills that include all the individual buildings. This process also includes the Terrace and QRRC locations. This is the perfect time to engage the new students and provide a re-fresher to faculty and staff. Additionally, the labs buildings 4 & 8 have fire drills conducted each quarter with the Childcare facility completing monthly fire drills.

A new type of emergency preparedness (ERP) drill came into effect in November of 2024 as per WSBC. All workplaces requiring first aid must complete an annual first aid drill to evaluate effectiveness testing the first aid response time, equipment and procedures. This ERP drill was also completed at the QRRC location.

How can we take action as an UNBC Community member?

Take 10 minutes each week to walk through your emergency exit route and know what muster area location. Locate and stay familiar with your nearest fire extinguisher, eye wash kits & emergency showers, naloxone kits and first aid kits (if & where applicable). This will help reduce anxiety and panic during crisis.


